Pursuant to a call by the reeve, the council met on Oct. 25th. Present: the reeve, and Councillors Hill, Hopper and Innes. The clerk read the minutes of the 21st Sept., which were approved. A communication from the Attorney-General's Department dated 19th Oct., was read. Mr. Innes introduced By-Law No. 160, to appropriate the balance of the Surplus Distribution Fund towards the reduction of the debt incurred in the erection of a new High School building in the village of Richmond Hill, which was read a first, second and third time and passed. The council adjourned.

## PRESENTATION OF PURSES.
