### OLD TIME DISCIPLINE.

Domestic servants did not have such an easy time of it three hundred years ago, judging from the following orders for the household servants of that witty epigrammatic court favorite, Sir John Harrington. They were first devised in 1566:

That no servant be absent from praier at morning or evening, without a lawful excuse to be alledged within one day after, upon paine to forfeit for every tyme 2d.

That none swear any othe, upon paine for every othe 1d.

That no man leave any doore open that he findeth shut, without there bee cause, upon paine for every tyme 1d.

That none of the men be in bed from our Lady Day to Michaelmas after six of the clock in the morning, nor out of his bed after ten of the clock at night; nor, from Michaelmas till our Lady Day in bed after seven in the morning; nor out after nine at night, without reasonable cause, on paine of 2d.

That no man's bed be unmade, nor fire or candle-box uncleaned after eight of the clock in the morning on paine of 1d.

That no man teach any of the children any unonest speeche, or bawdie word, or othe, on paine of 4d.

That no man waite at the table without a trencher in his hand except it be upon some good cause, on paine of 1d.

That no man appointed to waite, at my table be absent that meale without reasonable cause, on paine of 1d.

If any man breake a glasse hee shall answer the price therof out of his wages; and if it be not known who breake it the butler shall pay for it on paine of 12d.

The table must be covered halfe an hour before 11 at dinner and six at supper or before on paine of 2d.

That meate be readie at 11 or before at dinner and six or before at supper on paine of 6d.

That none be absent without leave of good cause on paine of 4d.

That no man strike his fellow on paine of losse of service; nor revile, or threaten, or provoke another to strike on paine of 12d.

That no man come to the kitchen without reasonable cause on paine of 1d., and the cook likewise to forfeit 1d.

That none toy with the maids, on paine of 4d.

That no man weare foule shirt on Sunday, nor broken hose or shoose, or dublett without buttons, on paine of 1d.

That when any stranger goeth hence the chamber be drest up againe within four hours after on paine of 1d.

That the hall be made cleane every day, by eight in the winter and seven in the summer; on paine of him that should do it to forfeit 1d.

That the court-gate be shutt each meale, and not opened during dinner and supper without just cause on paine the porter to forfeit for every time 1d.

That all stayrs in the house and other rooms that neede shall requyre, be made cleane on Fryday after dinner, on paine of forfeiture of every one whome it shall belong unto, 3d.

All which sommes shall be duly payde each quarter-day out of their wages, and bestowed on the poore, or other godly uses.

## JAPAN'S GREAT ENTERPRISE IN AMERICA.

### LARGE APPROPRIATION BY IMPERIAL DIET.

#### To Inform Americans How To Make Tea

Several months ago, the Japanese Tea Guild sent to this country a special commission, composed of Mr. S. Mitsuhashi, President of Shizouka Prefectural Assembly, and Mr. J. Ohara, member of Japanese Parliament, to investigate the condition of the Japanese Tea trade in the United States and Canada and to co-operate with Mr. T. Furuya and Mr. T. Mizutany, the American representatives of the Japanese Tea Guild, in giving publicity to the merits of Japanese Teas and the method of preparing them for drinking which would insure the best results.

Mr. Furuya and Mr. Mizutany are planning to open Tea Bazaars in many of the principal cities in the United States and Canada, where ladies can enjoy a cup of fine Japanese tea made by experts, and at the same time receive instructions which will enable them to make it equally well at home. More than half the Tea consumed in the United States and Canada is of Japanese growth, yet the majority of Americans, apparently do not understand how to prepare it so as to develop the delicious qualities which it contains. It is believed by these gentlemen that, when Americans are in possession of the secret of making good tea, the consumption in this country will fully equal that of Europe in proportion. The Japanese Government has appropriated a large fund to aid the Japanese Tea growers and Tea merchants in prosecuting this educational work, and it is hoped that American ladies will be apt students. The main Bureau of the Japanese Tea Guild has issued an official recipe for making Japanese Tea, the translation of which is as follows:

First.—Use a small, dry and thoroughly clean porcelain teapot.  
Second.—Put in one teaspoonful of tea, leaves for each cup of tea desired.  
Third.—When using Japanese Teas, pour on the required quantity of fresh boiled water, and let stand with closed lid from 2 to 3 minutes. Never boil the leaves. In order to retain the natural flavor, Japanese tea leaves should be kept in light can or jar, free from moisture.  
Note.—To thoroughly enjoy the natural, delicate and sweet flavor of Japanese Teas, neither sugar nor cream should be used.

### A PHOTOGRAPHIC IMPROVEMENT.

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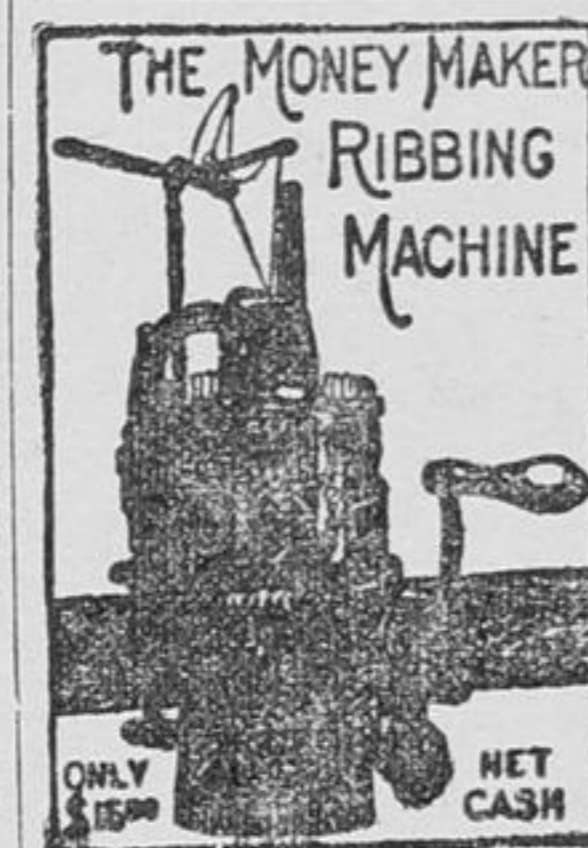
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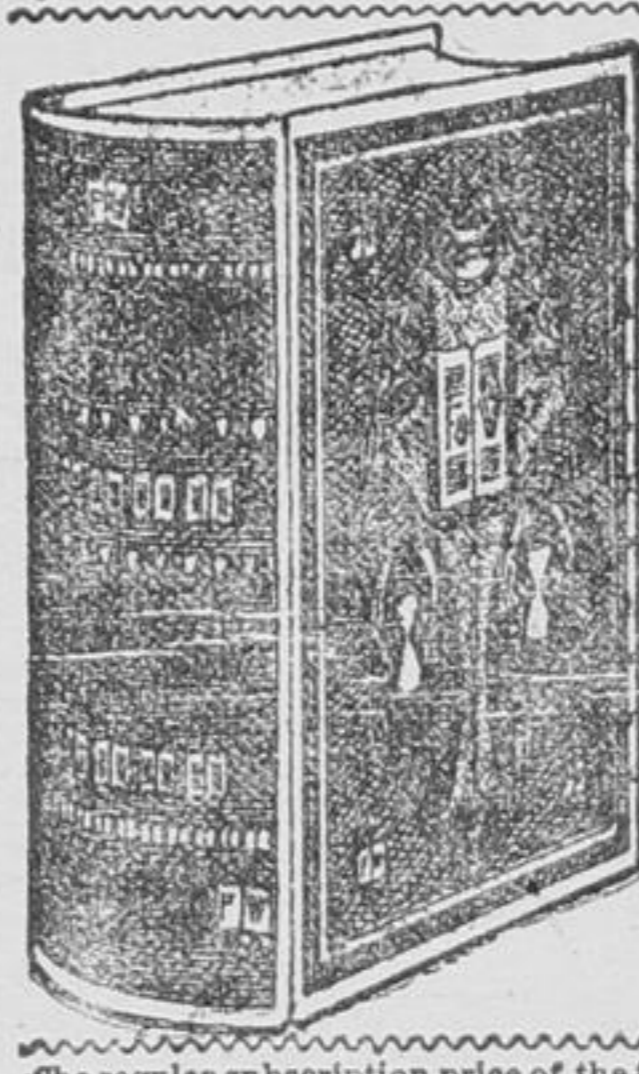
