More than half the Tea consumed in the United States and Canada is of Japanese growth, yet, the majority of Americans, apparently do not understand how to prepare it so as to develo; the delicious qualities which it contains. is believed by these gentlemen that, when Americans are in possession of the secret of making good tea, the consumption in this country will fully equal that of Europe in proportion. 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
