## A NONAGENARIAN.

Last Tuesday, the 18th inst., Mr. John Hutchinson of this village, reached his 90th birthday. The event was celebrated very quietly at the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. Isaac Crosby. Some relatives from a distance forwarded an intimation in the morning that it was their intention to dine with the old gentleman that day, and made their appearance on time to assist him in disposing of a plump turkey served up to grace the occasion. Mr. John Hutchinson is hale and hearty, though afflicted with blindness, and insists on having his breakfast at 7 o'clock every morning. His parents came from England about 1807. While residing in the United States, John was born at Boston in 1808. Leaving Boston in 1824 the family came to Canada, locating in township of Uxbridge (which then contained but seventeen families), where several of his family still reside. After five years they removed to Yonge St., near Machell's Corners, now the town of Aurora, where, as a farmer, he passed the greater part of his life. Here he married in 1830 the daughter of James Lloyd, Esq., one of the earliest settlers of that vicinity. Mrs. Hutchinson is still alive, a wife of 68 years, active and lively. When he came to Yonge St. he had not \$50. He bought a farm of 130 acres, paid for it in two years, and continued to make money. Retiring from farming, Mr. Hutchinson came to Richmond Hill about six years ago. He has a very retentive memory, and an intimate knowledge of the history of Yonge Street, having travelled it for more than three-quarters of a century. The scenes and excitement of 1836-37 are as familiar with him as though but of yesterday. He has four sons and four daughters living, several of whom are citizens of Uncle Sam's territory—one an ex-Mayor of Michigan City and an ex-State Senator of Indiana, and others who have played their parts in the political arena. 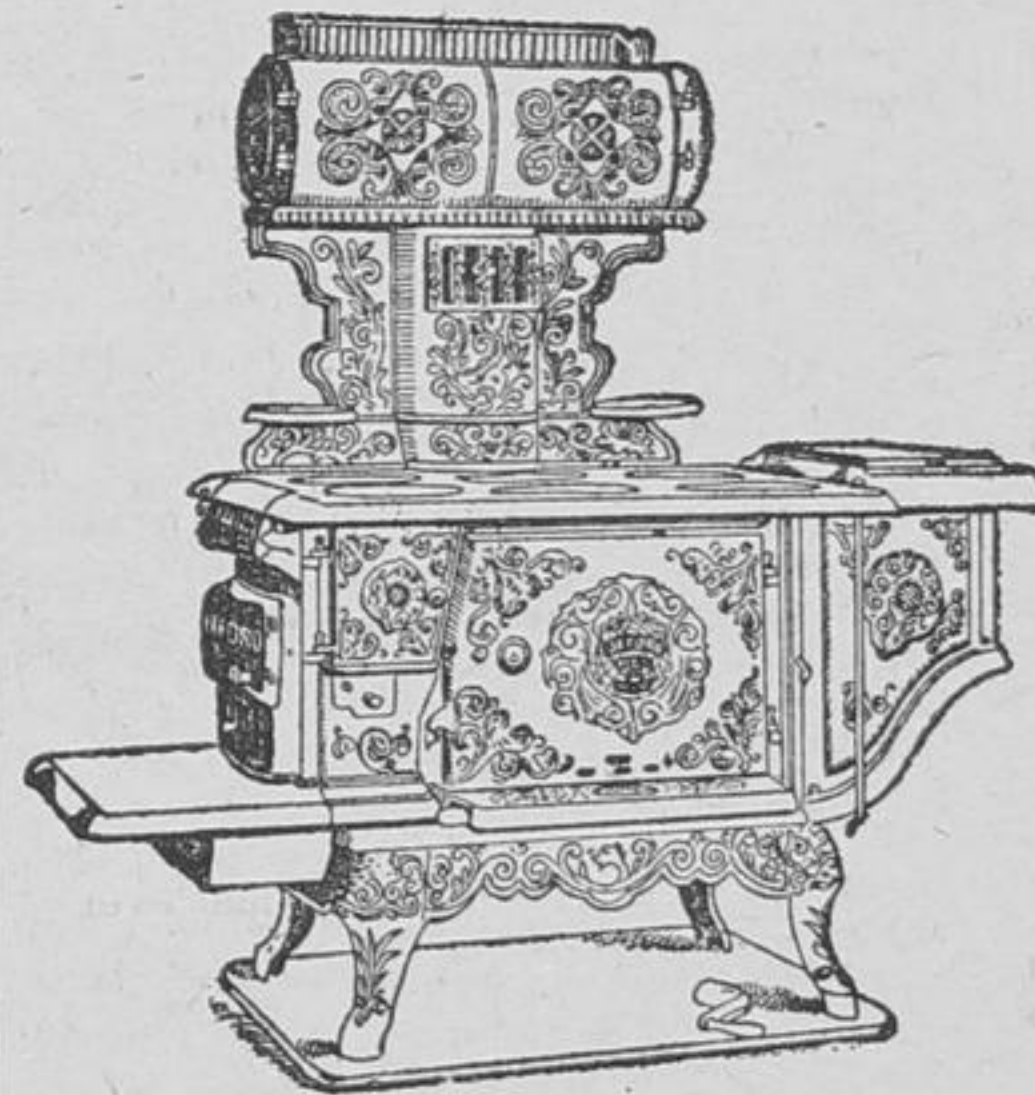
