His parents came from England about 1807. While residing in the United States, John was born at Boston in 1808. Leaving Boston in 1824 the family came to Canada, locating in township of Uxbridge (which then contained but seventeen families), where several of his family still reside. After five years they removed to Yonge St., near Machell's Corners, now the town of Aurora, where, as a farmer, he passed the greater part of his life. Here he married in 1830 the daughter of James Lloyd, Esq., one of the ealiest settlers of that vicinity. Mrs. Hutchinson is still alive, a wife of 68 years, active and lively. When he came to Yonge St. he had not \$50. He bought a farm of 130 acres, paid for it in two years, and continued to make money. Retiring from farming, Mr. Hutchinson came to Richmond Hill about six years ago. 
