THE THREE YORKS.

East, West and North York on Tuesday returned supporters of the Hardy Government. In East York Mr John Richardson was re-elected by a majority of 418 over Mr. Moves; in West York, Mr. W. J. Hill changed Mr. St. John majority of 53 into a minority of 48, and in the North Hon. E. J. Davis defeated Col. Waying, increasing his former majority of 279 to 475. The three Yorks will be well represented in the new Parliament.

Toronto elected four men as supporters of Mr. Whitney. The majorities, however, are much smaller than they were four years ago. At that time the majorities totalled over 6,000, and on Tuesday they were reduced to less than 3,000.

Markham Council.

The Markham Township Council met at Victoria Hall, Unionville, on Saturday the 19th inst. Members all present. Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Communication received from Good Roads Machinery Co. re crusher. A petition was presented by Mr. Eckardt from Jas. Eckardt and 74 others asking for a grant sufficient to grade and gravel the 6th con. from lot 1 to lot 15 inclusive, to connect with Scarborough Kennedy Road.

Eckardt—Steele—that the treasurer tender Dr. Hutchison \$20 as payment in full for attendance and medicine supplied to Mrs. Harper and family.

Dimma—Eckardt—that the treasurer pay on order of the mover \$1 per week to Mrs. Harper and family (indigent) during the pleasure of the council.

Dimma—Eckardt—that the treasurer pay the following accounts: \$41.30, percentage added to taxes paid after Dec. 14th to R. Lunau collector for east half, and \$43.56, percentage added to taxes paid after Dec. 14th to C. H. Stiver, collector of west half of the township, be now paid to the treasurer and added to the general receipts of the township.

Quantz—Dimma—that the treasurer pay the following accounts: Municipal World, for 5 copies for members of Council, \$5; H. Bennett, for three days work on road in R. D. No. 31, \$2; Corson & Son, ad. for tenders for cedar, \$1.37; Brown Bros., for stationery for use of council and treasurer's cash book, \$4.50; Mr. Frisby, operating grader to date, \$3.25; W. F. Ratcliffe, 443 feet lumber per order of W. Scott, com., per W. Frisby; D. McCaffary, necessities supplied the Henley family during illness of Jno. Westland, \$4.30; W. Borton, \$5 yds. gravel, J. Turner, R. O., \$3.50; Michael Connelly, one day work filling was out on Pomona Road \$1.

Quantz—Dimma—that the mover and clerk be commissioners to readjust R. D. No. 2, east and west, and No. 3. Eckardt—Steele—that when this council adjourns it stands adjourned until Saturday, the 12th day of March next.

Quantz—Dimma—that on order of the mover the treasurer pay one half the amount of the following accounts for work performed on Yonge Street: W. Chatterly, 5 days, \$5; D. Boyle, 3 days, \$3; M. Coulen, 1 day, \$1; A. Chatterly, 5 days, \$5; W. Chatterly, 5 days, horse and cart, \$10; W. J. Hearne, 6 days, \$6; Lackie Bros., 1 day, horse and cart, \$2; W. Horne, breaking loose stone, \$5.

Quantz—Dimma—that the reeve be commissioner to make satisfactory arrangements in regard to the treasurer's bonds at the earliest possible date.

The council in committee of the whole audited the treasurer's accounts for 1897. Quantz—Steele—that the auditors' report for 1897 as finally audited, be and is hereby accepted.

Dimma—Quantz—that the tender of Corson & Son for printing municipal accounts, voters' lists and statements for 1898 be accepted. Council adjourned.

The High School Entrance and Public School Leaving examination for 1898 will begin on Tuesday 28th of June at 8.45 a. m., and will be conducted under the same regulations as were in force in 1897. Candidates who purpose writing at either of these examinations should notify the Inspector or the head master of the High School before the first of May, but this is not compulsory as all who present themselves for the examination, are allowed to write. A fee of \$1 will be charged for each of these examinations at all the High Schools in the county, to be paid at time of writing. The subjects of the first day's examinations are: English Grammar Geography and Dictation; for the second day, Arithmetic, Drawing and History; for the third day, English Literature, Writing, Physiology and Temperance. Reading at such times as suits the examiners. After this year the Public School Leaving Examinations will be conducted by the new regulations.
