Our village has been overshadowed with sorrow and regret at the sudden death of one of our most respected and promising young men in the person of Mr. John Henricks. Though he was not feeling well when his friend called for him, he concluded to go. But he grew worse after leaving home and on his return called at the doctor's. On coming home he was confined to bed until death ended his sufferings on Wednesday morning the 9th inst., that dread ailment, appendicitis, having developed in its most malignant form.

John was just beginning life in earnest. Only last fall his father died, leaving him as the head of the family, and support of his mother and younger brothers and sisters, of whom there are eight surviving him.
