FOUND GUILTY.

Daniel Seabeck received his trial at the Sessions in Toronto, and on Saturday was found guilty on a charge of conspiracy and fabricating evidence. It was clearly shown at the trial that he had deliberately planned to have Thomas Hurlburt, a farm labourer, committed to goal on an alleged attempt to poison his wife. From a previous account of the affairs given in THE LIBERAL when the preliminary trial was held here, it will be remembered that Hurlburt was arrested at the instigation of Seabeck, and lodged in goal. At the investigation which followed, Hurlburt was liberated and Seabeck arrested on the charge of conspiracy. Hurlburt had first been arrested on the strength of a letter which Seabeck claimed he had found in the former's woodshed, which was alleged to have been written by Hurlburt, and which threatened the life of his wife, as well as suicide. It was proven at the trial that Seabeck was the author of this letter, and that Mrs. Hurlburt knew too much about it. When the prisoner was convicted on Saturday Mrs. Seabeck, who appears to have played a conspicuous part, was moved to tears. Seabeck was on Monday sentenced by Judge McDougall to 4 years in the Kingston penitentiary. Little sympathy will be shown for such a miserable wretch as Seabeck has shown himself to be.
