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Division Court

Only two cases came before His Honour, Judge Morgan, at Division Court held here on Monday, as follows:

Morgan v. Stephenson.—Plaintiff sued defendant for balance of wages due, amounting to \$7.50. Defendant put in a counter claim of \$4.00 for two weeks' board, and \$3.50 for wear of a pair of boots and a coat. Judgment for plaintiff with full costs, less \$1.00 for use of boots.

Hooper v. Hooper.—Plaintiff sued for wages, 7 months at \$12, less \$7.50 received in cash, \$76.50. Judge Morgan allowed \$12 a month for 3 months, \$36, and \$8 a month for 4 months, \$32. He then deducted \$11 for clothing, \$7.50 cash and \$11.50 paid into court. Judgment was given for the balance, \$38.

The only lawyers in attendance were Mr. A. G. F. Lawrence and Mr. F. W. Garvin.

The next court will be held on Monday, the 13th of June.

The following accounts were read, and on motion were adopted:—
Jos. Hall, brooms, \$3.00; W. Hewison, calsoning and painting Junior Department of Public School \$16.70.

Moved by Mr. Sanderson seconded by Mr. McNair that Mr. John Harris' claim of \$25 for drawing plans for the High School be paid—Lost.

Moved by Mr. Storey, seconded by Mr. Newton that a committee consisting of the chairman and Mr. Harrison, be appointed to wait on Mr. Harris relative to dispute about plans, without prejudice.—Carried.

A committee was appointed to level up and seed the High School grounds, The Board then adjourned.
