RICHMOND HILL, April 7, 1898
MAIL SERVICE.

The report of the Postmaster General just to hand gives \$1,120 as the annual expenditure in the transportation of mail matter from Richmond Hill, Thornhill and other places along Yonge street between this village and Toronto. The various sums paid are as follows:

Bedford Park and Toronto	\$100 00
Deer Park and Yorkville	83 30
Langstaff and Thornhill	100 00
Richmond Hill and railway	313 00
Thornhill and railway	275 00
Thornhill and Toronto	249 00

This seems to be a large amount of money to pay for the accommodation received. In this village the citizens have to wait for their mail until 10.45 a. m., and in the evening the time is about 7.45. When it is considered that the first Metropolitan car reaches here every morning at 8.15, business men naturally think it a hardship to have to wait for their morning mail another two hours and a half. The government should endeavor to give a more satisfactory service.

Messrs. Crossley and Hunter, the well-known evangelists, have suggested a new form of ballot which might be used at Dominion, Provincial, or Municipal elections. The proposed ballot is divided into two parts, and on each part is a circle opposite the name of each candidate. There is also a finger pointing to each circle where the voter is expected to mark his ballot. We believe that such a ballot would answer a good purpose, and see no reason why any person who can read should mark in the wrong place unless he does it intentionally. At present voters are instructed to make a cross at the right hand side of the candidate's name for whom he wishes to vote, but the law does not say that a cross any other place will not be counted. There is too much latitude allowed for Deputy-Returning officers, returning officers and judges, and there is too much stress laid upon "the intention of the voter." Without a doubt the intention of a voter is often to cause trouble for those who have to count the ballots. This can easily be done by those who care not which candidate is elected. A voter should be compelled to make his cross in one of two places, failing which he should lose his vote.

Messrs. D. Gunn, Brothers & Co., Toronto, have just issued their annual circular, drawing special attention to the importance of the egg trade in this country. The circular goes to show that the foreign exportation of eggs is capable of vast expansion. Nearly \$15,000,000 is spent annually by Britain alone in purchasing foreign supplies, and it is claimed that as we now have a fast steamship service and cold storage carrying facilities, Canada should supply a good part of the demand. Some years ago when the United States Government put a duty on eggs of 5 cents a dozen it was feared that the Canadian trade would be considerably injured. This has not been the case, however, as the price of eggs in Toronto at the end of March was as high as it was in New York City. In fact the United States have become exporters of eggs themselves, they having sent to the British Isles last year about a million dozen. Gunn's circular gives valuable hints to those in the trade.

Hon. Wm. Mulock, Postmaster-General, has introduced a bill proposing several amendments to the Post Office Act. It is proposed to change letter postage from three cents per ounce or fraction of an ounce to two cents per ounce or fraction of an ounce. It is also proposed to impose postage on newspapers from the office of publication at the rate of half a cent a pound. This will apply only to newspapers sent more than ten miles from the point of publication. Mr. Mulock contends that the free transmission of newspapers has become a serious matter for the revenue of the country.

Forty-five bicyclists were up in the Toronto Police Court this week charged with riding on sidewalks and boulevards. The fine inflicted in each case was \$2 and costs, but it is proposed to make the fine \$5 until the practice is discontinued. When some one is run-down and badly injured in Richmond Hill there will likely be an earnest effort made to put a stop to bicycling on our sidewalks. Wheelmen should bear in mind that we have a by-law here similar to that in Toronto.

Most of the fall wheat came through the winter without injury, and looked exceedingly well up to the latter part of March. The present cold snap, however, will have an injurious effect on the crop as the frost has been unusually severe during the past ten days. Were the ground covered with a coat of snow the roots would be protected, but as the fields have been bare for some time the farmers are naturally fearful of the results. Seldom do we see in this part of Ontario such a degree of frost in the month of April.

During the past week the relations between the United States and Spain have been very much strained, but the latest dispatches are more favorable towards a peaceful settlement. President McKinley's message which was to have been given to Congress yesterday has been postponed until next Monday, the idea being to give Gen. Lee time to withdraw the American residents from Havana. Many changes will take place before Monday, and it is thought that war may yet be averted.

The protest against the return of Mr. John Richardson, Liberal member-elect for East York, has fallen through owing to the expiration of the time during which the \$1,000 forfeit has to be put up. It is one thing to enter a petition against the return of a member, but it is quite another thing to show that there has been anything corrupt on the part of the candidate or his agents.

An exchange asks the very pertinent question—"What's the matter with our boys?" and proffers an answer which is given in four words—"Lack of Parental Control." The solution is not far from being correct. Public school teachers and Sabbath school teachers can do a great deal in moulding the character of children, but no outside influences can remove responsibility from the shoulders of parents.
