RICHMOND HILL, June 30, 1898

The Mail and Empire of Monday contained a lengthy article, the object being to endeavor to prove that the Roman Catholics are organizing a new political association in order that they may receive justice from the Dominion and Provincial Governments. It claimed that ever since the Laurier Cabinet was formed discontent has been growing among the Irish Catholics as they have practically no representation from this province, and that "the long continued illness of Hon. Mr. Harty has left them practically without representation in Mr. Hardy's Cabinet." We are inclined to think that the wish is rather of the thought. No doubt the Mail would be pleased to see any organization formed that would injure the Dominion premier. If Sir Wilfrid Laurier to-day should appoint another Catholic a member of his Cabinet, no matter how well qualified he might be for the position, the cry would be raised in some quarters that the appointment was made, not because the gentleman would be able to fill the position well but because of his religion. Sir Oliver Mowat was always accused of granting too many favors to the Catholics, now it is claimed they do not get their share. If Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. A. S. Hardy can strike a medium they will certainly be fortunate, and that is what they seem to have done so far.

The Toronto World thinks that Yonge Street, the connecting link between Lake Ontario and Lake Simcoe, has a great future before it if certain conditions are complied with. An editorial bearing on the subject reads as follows:—"The greatest road in Canada is or ought to be Yonge-street from Lake Ontario to Lake Simcoe. There are many fine farms, many thriving villages between the city of Toronto and Holland Landing and any amount of good country on either side of it; but there are two things necessary to make this fine road and tract of country much more valuable than it is to-day, and that is the extension of the electric street car service to Lake Simcoe and the establishment of a system of water works on the street with provision for its extension east and west. We would suggest that the various municipalities along the street should join with the county council in ascertaining what such a system would cost. Yonge-street with an electric service and a water supply would become the greatest thirty mile road in America. Such a road or street would benefit the city and county enormously, and would greatly enhance the value of all the property on the line. What is wanted is some kind of joint action. Electric cars and a water system will build up all the villages and benefit the district for miles on either side of the street."

The Toronto World of Thursday contained a "write up" of our village occupying about two columns and a half of space. The article gave a good many particulars concerning Richmond Hill past and present, and showed that in many ways and particularly as a residential centre we occupy a high position. The writer referred to our fine schools, our good fire protection, our public library, our churches, our railway connection, our hotels, &c., and described a large number of our business places. It is to be hoped, however that strangers who read the description will not think that the business of Richmond Hill is confined to these mentioned in the article of Thursday.

The Markham Township Council met at Victoria Hall, Unionville, on Tuesday, June 21st inst. Members all present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes read and confirmed.
