RICHMOND HILL, August 4, 1898

Tuberculosis, generally spoken of as consumption, seems to be on the increase. The July report issued by the Provincial Board of Health shows the deaths from contagious diseases in the province as reported to the Registrar-General by the Division Registrars throughout Ontario. The total number of deaths for April, May and June is 679, and of this number 501 are from tuberculosis. The remainder, 178 is put down as diphtheria, typhoid, whooping cough, measles and scarlatina. The public have a great dread of such diseases as diphtheria, yet the number of deaths from that source is very light in comparison to lung troubles.

The first session of the Ninth Legislature was opened by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor yesterday afternoon. Mr. Evanturel was elected speaker without opposition. As the session was called for a special purpose the bill of fare in the speech from the throne was necessarily light. There will in all probability be some sharp debating when the question comes up relative to the right of constables to vote at a provincial election.

General regret is expressed over the sudden and unexpected death of the late Archbishop Walsh. This regret is felt not only by the co-religionists of the dead Archbishop but by thousands of Protestants. He was beloved by his church as a wise and trusted counsellor, and he was looked upon by the general public as a broad-minded Canadian.
