61 lbs.—1c. more than market price.
60 lbs.—Market price.
59 lbs.—1c. less than market price.
58 lbs.—2c. less than market price.
57 lbs.—5c. less than market price.
56 lbs.—8c. less than market price.
55 lbs.—12c. less than market price.
54 lbs.—16c. less than market price.
53 lbs.—20c. less than market price.

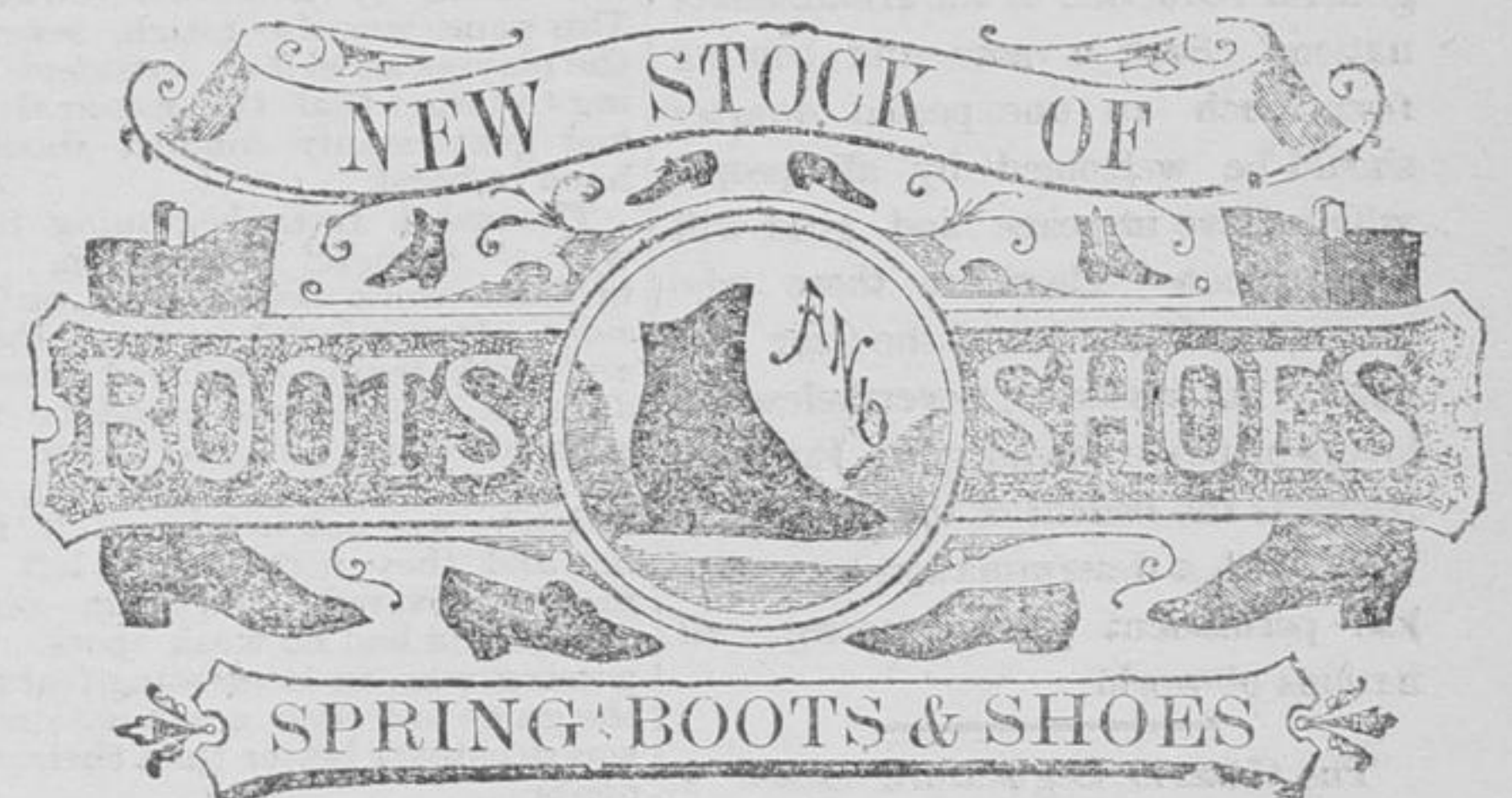
