The other charge was that a number of Government supporters got their majorities only by the vote of constables who had served outside COMPANY, LIMITED, Toronto. the polling booths on election day. Mr. Whitney claimed that the votes of such constables should not be counted, and that several members were not legally elected. A few days ago the Court of Appeal decided unanimously that the constables referred to were not disfranchised, and that the Ontario Election Act never meant to disfranchise them.


