EXPERIMENTAL UNION.

We have received the programme of the next annual meeting of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union which is to be held at the Agricultural College at Guelph. The "Union" will commence with a public meeting in the large Convocation Hall on the college grounds on the evening of December 7th. There will be six sessions in all, and the meeting will close on Friday afternoon, the 9th of December.

The summary results of the field experiments conducted this year on over three thousand farms will be presented and discussed at this meeting. This along with the reports on co-operative work in horticulture, dairying, bee-keeping, soil physics, and the weeds of Ontario should make the meeting interesting and profitable to all.

We also notice that Prof. C. F. Curtiss, Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station of Iowa, and Mrs. S. T. Rorer, Principal of the Philadelphia Cooking School, and an associate editor of the Ladies' Home Journal, have been engaged to speak at the meeting.

The Guelph Fat Stock and Poultry Show, and the annual meeting of the Ontario Bee Keepers' Association, are both to be held in Guelph on the 6th, 7th and 8th of December, and the annual meeting of the Guelph Poultry Association on Thursday of the same week.

Arrangements have been made with the railway companies for reduced rates to Guelph to attend the Experimental Union Meeting, and other interesting events which take place during that week.

The following paragraph appeared in the Richmond Hill correspondence of Tuesday's World:—

The funeral of the late Chas. Henry Keffler took place from his late residence on Friday afternoon, when a large number of relatives and friends followed his remains to the cemetery a short distance east of the village. Deceased was widely known and highly respected as evidenced by the long concourse of people at the funeral, and the many expressions of esteem which fell from the lips of those who looked upon his countenance for the last time on this side of the grave. The funeral was conducted under Masonic honors, the brethren walking by the side of the hearse from the residence to the place of interment. A short service was held in St. Stephen's Church, where a touching and effective sermon was preached by the rector, Rev. E. G. Dymond. The rev. gentleman spoke in the most feeling terms of the deceased brother, and referred particularly to his fidelity to the Church. While in health, and after when scarcely able to leave his home, Mr. Keffler was never absent from church services and from the communion table. After the church service at the grave, the Masonic ceremony was read by Rev. Chas. Cocking, a member of Robertson Lodge, assisted by W. Bro. Leeds Richardson, The secretary, W. Bro. Dr. Sisley, when depositing the scroll in the grave, stated that deceased had been a member of Vaughan Lodge since December 27th, 1870. The pall-bearers were Bros. P. G. Savage, F. McConaghy, T. F. McMahon, H. A. Nicholls, T. Keys and Simon Shunk.

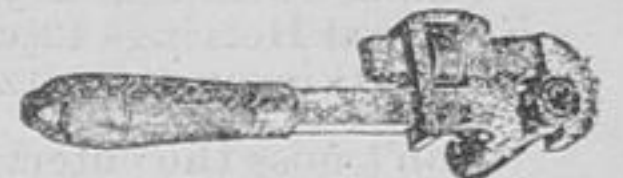
