VILLAGE NOMINATIONS.

Nomination of candidates for the offices of reeve, councillors and Public School trustees will take place in the Council Chamber next Monday, December 26, at 12 o'clock, noon. Our citizens should show their interest in public matters, by not only attending the meeting and seeing that suitable nominations are made for the various offices, but they should be anxious to hear discussed any question relating to the welfare of our people. Whether the offices are filled by acclamation or not every person accepting a position should be prepared to express himself on past events and future prospects. And as has been pointed out on former occasions every municipal officer should attend the nomination. Then, if any complaints are to be made the officers can receive them in person. Those rate-payers who do not attend the nominations at all, or who run away as soon as the candidates are proposed, are generally those who do the most grumbling.

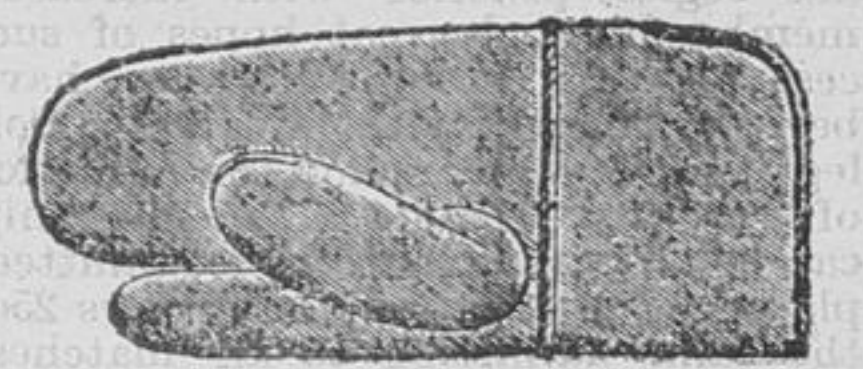
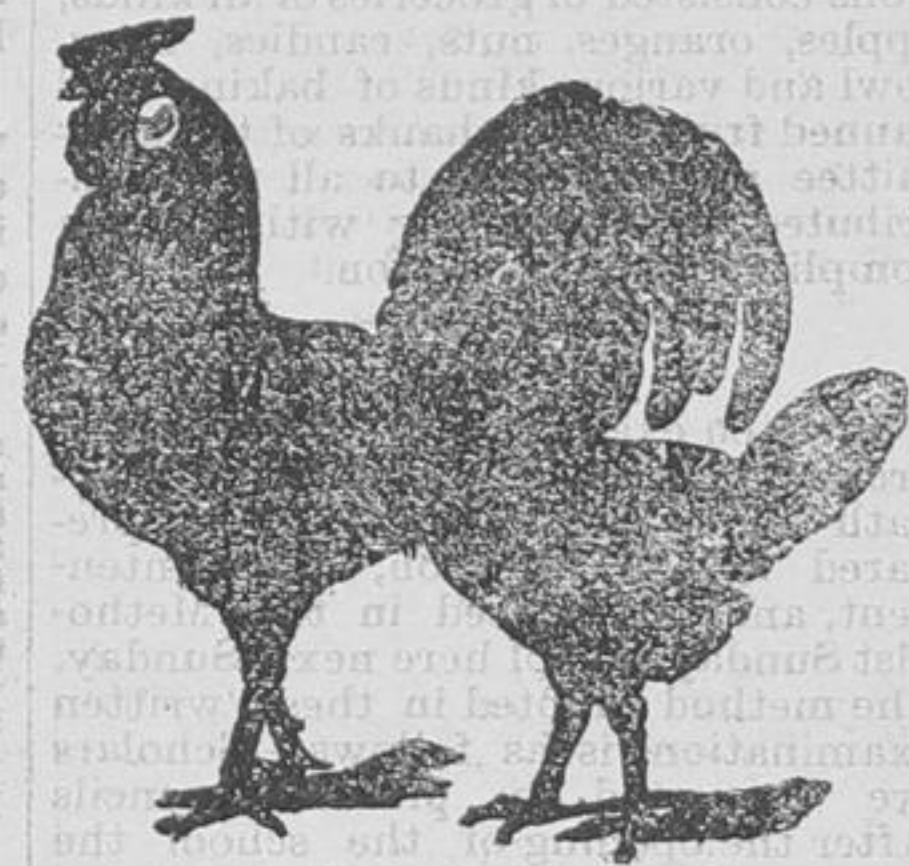
