THE COMING ARCHBISHOP.

There is a large measure of expectancy throughout the Roman Catholic diocese of Toronto as to the successor of the late Archbishop Walsh. The name of Bishop O'Connor of London, was the first of the three names sent to Rome for the office; it is not known, however, that His Lordship is willing to leave London, a diocese with which he has long been familiar, to assume new responsibilities in Toronto. The bishops of the province of Quebec, it is believed, are pressing Bishop O'Connor to accept the Toronto see. The second name in the three sent to Rome is that of Rev. Father Teefy of St. Michael's College, and the World would not be surprised if the high honor came to him. Certainly no priest in the diocese is more worthy, or more fitted to undertake the charge. He is a good Catholic, a learned scholar, a native of the diocese, a successful teacher, and thoroughly acquainted with the diocese and the entire Province of Ontario. He is also familiar with the needs of the diocese, with the educational work under way, and with the relation that Catholic higher education in Toronto bears to the Provincial University. He is a young man, has first-class administrative capacity, and his appointment would be one gratifying, not only to Catholics, but to the whole community.—The Toronto World.

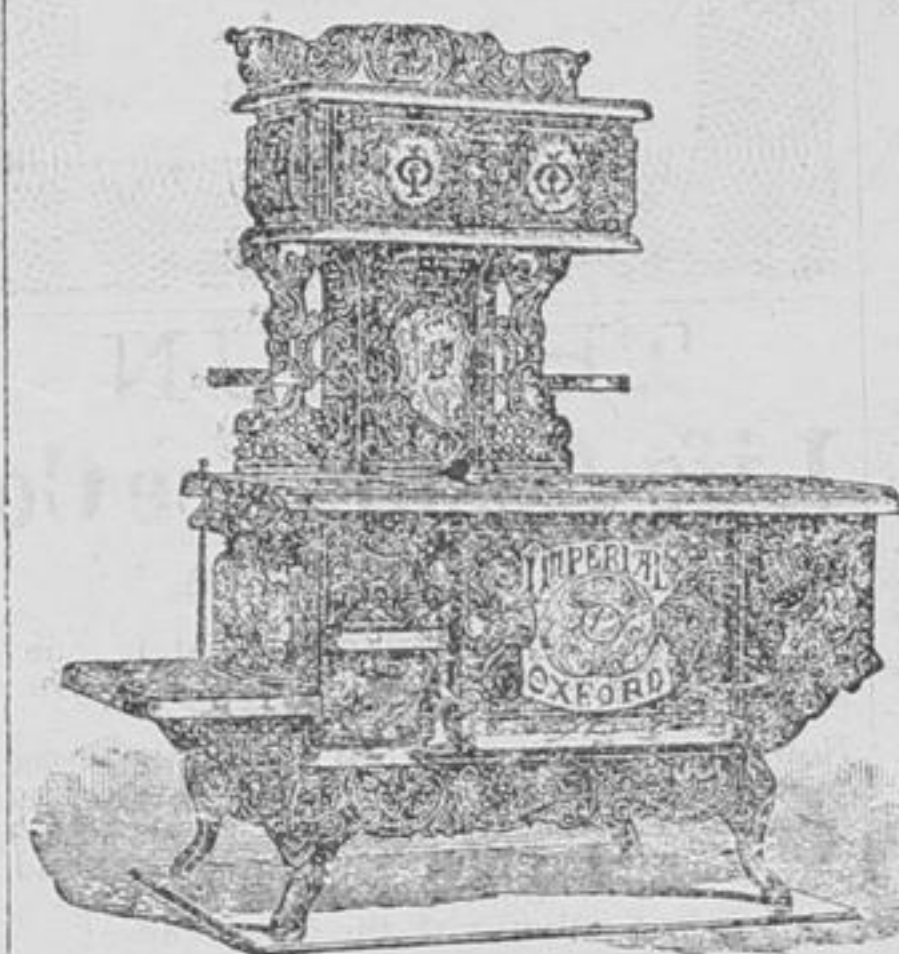
