**LORD HERSCHELL'S DEATH.**

The altogether unexpected death of Baron Herschell, at Washington last week, came as a terrible shock to the English-speaking world, a shock intensified by the sadness of the attendant circumstance. The deceased statesman, one of the foremost in the Councils of the Empire, had desired personally to return home some weeks ago, but his strong sense of duty detained him. Few men have left behind them a nobler record of service for their country, and few are more sincerely mourned by all classes. Those who knew him best regret his loss most deeply. His place on the Venezuela Boundary Commission and on the High Joint Commission will be most difficult to fill, for his great knowledge of the subjects under consideration, his keen legal judgment, and his diplomatic experience made him an ideal arbitrator and counsellor.

The World of Monday in an article of about three quarters of a column in length, contained the somewhat startling news that the Canadian Pacific Railway had got the hold of the Metropolitan, that the C. P. R. would soon be running trains over this road between Toronto and Barrie, and that steam engines would be used over the new line. This "Latest Scheme," as the World calls it, was contradicted the following day by engineer Jennings and Mr. J. W. Moyes, who say that there is no connection between the Metropolitan and the C. P. R. Mr. Jennings says, however, that if the Metropolitan purpose doing a freight business they would naturally seek a connection not only with the C. P. R., but with the Grand Trunk.

The liquor men of the province waited on the Ontario Government a few days ago and protested against the proposal to raise the price of licenses in cities. In view of the fact that those who secure licenses for hotels in Toronto are always able to sell them at a very high advance, the Government are justified in increasing the fee in that city at least. And no doubt what applies to Toronto applies to other large cities as well.


