The Leader and Recorder, the Conservative organ of West York, suggests that Sir Wilfrid Laurier should redeem his promise to the temperance party by introducing a measure of prohibition in the House. The Leader and Recorder reasons that the Dominion Government should rely for support not only on the 23 per cent. who cast their ballots in favor of prohibition, but upon thousands who did not vote at all. Referring to the recent plebiscite our cotem. says:—

"It is well known that thousands of prohibitionists did not exercise their franchise, as they had no faith in the promise of politicians."

We have little faith in those prohibitionists who refrained from voting on the plea that they had no confidence in the promise of politicians. Those in favor of prohibition for the Dominion never had a better chance, and never will have a better chance, to show their colors, and it ill becomes them now to lay the blame on other shoulders. With a sweeping majority for prohibition the Government would have been compelled to enact a law, failing in which it would have been taken up by the Opposition.

If the Leader and Recorder honestly thinks the country is ripe for prohibition why does it not recommend Sir Charles Tupper and the Conservative party to father it, and ask Hon. N. C. Wallace to start the ball rolling right in our own constituency?


