**THE PACIFIC CABLE.**

Considerable disappointment is being expressed on all sides in the apparent lack of interest and cooperation suddenly displayed by the Imperial Government in the Pacific Cable scheme. Canada had been given to understand right along that just so soon as she was prepared to shoulder her share of the responsibilities, the Imperial Government would accept her proportion, and the matter would immediately assume definite shape. So thoroughly was everyone imbued with this idea that the Opposition was most insistent in Parliament and out, in its demand that the Government should not delay to accept their portion of the liability. Just as quickly as necessary preliminaries had been attended to the Government announced its readiness to cooperate with the Australian Colonies and with the Home Government, and it was supposed that the last difficulty had been overcome. The unqualified expression of satisfaction with which this announcement was received both in Canada and England, received an unexpected check, when the announcement was called that the Imperial Government was not prepared to accept its share of the constructional cost, but would only contribute \$100,000 a year subsidy for twenty years to support the undertaking. So the matter stands at this moment, but the Laurier Government and the Australian Governments show no desire to recede from their position, and the hope is not yet abandoned that the new difficulties may be overcome as successfully as all other obstacles have been up to the present time and that this most important link in the chain of intercommunication may be successfully forged, without further serious delay.

**SUNDAY CYCLING.**

It is to be regretted that bicycling on the Sabbath is becoming so alarmingly prevalent. The pulpit is almost a unit in condemning Sunday cars, but seldom do we observe that a voice of warning is raised against Sunday wheeling which in many cases is nothing less than Sabbath desecration. Every Sunday through the wheeling season scores, yes hundreds, of bicyclists can be seen passing up and down Yonge street, frequently in companies of dozens, half dozens or smaller groups, and no doubt this is the case to a greater or less extent along all public highways. Sunday bicycling, when it is necessary, is just as legitimate as Sunday driving with a horse and carriage. That which is to be condemned is the practice of Sunday amusements which always have a demoralizing influence, and are never conducive to spiritual interests. If seekers of real pleasure would but examine their own past lives they would come to the conclusion that the purest pleasure is derived not by plunging forward in the direction of Sunday recreation but by walking steadily in the path of duty.
