DISTRICT MEETING.

The Annual District Meeting of the Toronto Central District was held in the Methodist Church Thursday and Friday, May 25th and 26th. Rev. W. R. Parker, D. D., presiding. Rev. R. S. E. Large, B. A., B. D., was elected secretary. The ministerial session occupied the morning and afternoon of the first day, when, as is customary, ministerial character was reviewed, probationary, supernumerary, and superannuated relations determined, and the general spiritual interests of the various circuits discussed. During the second day the ministry and laity in combined session reviewed the statistical reports of all the circuits of the district, which showed a net increase in the total membership and financial returns. Rev. J. W. Stewart of Maple, was elected representative to the Stationing Committee; Rev. W. J. Smith, B. A., and Mr. A. Ogden to the Conference Sabbath School Committee; Rev. E. A. Pearson, B.A., and Mr. Fred Dane to the Epworth League Committee; and Mr. Warring Kennedy as Laymen's Representative on the Missionary Board, with Mr. A. Ogden as alternate. A committee, composed of the chairman of the district and five laymen, was appointed to meet with the joint Boards of the Newton Brook and Willowdale circuits and ascertain the possibility of uniting the two circuits. A resolution touching the last Prohibition Plebiscite, the selling of cigarettes to youths, the enfranchisement of women and Prison Reform was endorsed and referred to the annual Conference Committee on Memorials. It was determined that the next annual meeting be held in the Queen St. Methodist Church, Toronto. A pleasant feature of the gathering was the luncheon of the delegates in the Lecture Room of the church. The visitors thoroughly enjoyed the bounties so tastily provided by the ladies of the local Methodist Church, and were ardent in their expressions of appreciation.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

The second district meeting of the Central division of the Young People's Union of the Presbytery of Toronto was held in the Presbyterian church here on Tuesday. The afternoon meeting which was presided over by Rev. J. A. Grant, M. A., was opened by a service of praise and prayer, after which Mr. Grant in the name of his congregation extended a hearty welcome to the delegates. The first address which was on "Personal Consecration" was given by Rev. Joseph Watt of Laskay. The Rev. Walter Amos, Aurora, followed with an address on "The Man in Christian Work." Both addresses were able and exceedingly helpful. After discussion on these subjects in which Rev. John Wilkie, India, and Dr. McTavish, Toronto, took part the Rev. Alex. McGillivray, Bonar church, Toronto, gave an excellent address on "Continuance." The Rev. Joseph Hamilton, Mimico, gave a clear and practical address on "Where the Chain Snaps." These subjects were further discussed by Rev. Alex. Gilray and John McP. Scott, Toronto. This very profitable session was closed by the Rev. C. A. Campbell, of Maple. At the evening meeting Rev. Dr. McLaughlin presided, and interesting and able addresses were given by Rev. A. Gilray, Rev. J. Wilkie, and Rev. Dr. Carmichael. Rev. A. Gilray who had for his subject, "Young People and Home Missions," dealt principally with Manitoba, the North West Territory and British Columbia, referred to many of those missionaries who had done excellent work in the districts mentioned. Rev. Mr. Wilkie who spoke on Foreign Missions gave a good description of India in which country he has recently labored. Although a wonderful country in many respects and a great manufacturing centre, the address went to show that the whole system was built up at the expense of woman who is cruelly and shamefully treated in accordance with Hindu customs and laws. The speaker referred to the necessity of women missionaries who could do good work in places where men were not allowed to enter. Rev. Dr. Carmichael speaking on his subject "Aim High" gave some sterling advice to young people, and interspersed his remarks with choice anecdotes and appropriate illustrations. The music rendered by the choir was very highly appreciated, the musicians receiving at the close of the meeting a hearty vote of thanks. Between the afternoon and evening sessions the delegates were entertained at tea in the basement of the church by the ladies of the congregation.
