THE DEACONESS HOME.

A careful perusal of the Annual Report of the Toronto Deaconess Home and Training school, which has just been published, will convince the reader that a good work is being done in and through that branch of the Methodist church. The Home is situated at 257 Jarvis street, and is controlled by a Board of Management, the superintendent of the institution being Miss Scott who appears to be particularly well adapted for the christian work in which she is engaged. The following items from the Annual Report will show the nature and extent of the work which was prosecuted during the past year: Over 10,000 calls were made and received; 2,697 half-worn and 594 new garments were distributed; 580 families were supplied with food; employment was found for 375 persons; 4,168 hours were spent in nursing the sick; over 400 meetings were addressed; and \$319.58 emergency money was spent.

During the past year the home received considerable assistance from kind and thoughtful friends whose generosity will no doubt be an incentive to others who wish to encourage work of a benevolent nature. As much is required for an institution of this kind it might not be out of place to explain that a box of produce sent in from the country would be just as acceptable as its equivalent in money.

If the parties now under arrest at Montreal, charged with plundering from passengers who were on the illfated steamer Scotsman, are proven to be guilty they will no doubt receive the penalty they richly deserve. While women and children were drowning in the ocean and crying for help dozens of inhuman sailors' and stokers were breaking open trunks, pillaging in all directions and drinking the liquor which was found on board. Valuable articles such as diamond rings, gold watches, all kinds of jewelry, and fine clothing, have been found on the parties arrested at Montreal to the amount of probably \$4,000.

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

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
