RADIAL RAILWAY SCHEME.

The Metropolitan Railway Company, which operates the trolley line running northwards from the C. P. R. crossing on Yonge street, has applied to the City engineer for permission to construct a connection between their tracks on Yonge Street and the C. P. R. tracks. The company has purchased a large electric locomotive for hauling freight cars, and wants to make the connection in order to run their trains to the new St. Lawrence market, via the C. P. R. to Leaside Junction and down the Don valley. There has been some difficulty caused by the presence of the Metropolitan Company's rails on Yonge street, to the extension of the city car service up to Reservoir Park and the city limits, and there is a feeling that the council should take advantage of the opportunity to make an arrangement by which the difficulty may be removed.—Globe.
