### Village Council.

The council met in the Clerk's office on Tuesday, October 31st, at 8.30 p. m.

Members present, the Reeve, Councillors Hill, Innes and Trench.

Minutes of 29th Sept. read and approved.

The following account was read and ordered to be paid: Joseph Hall, account for oil and 2 lamp glasses, \$13.50.

The clerk read a communication from the clerk of the council of the municipality of North Toronto enclosing a resolution passed by the council of that corporation in reference to the Electric Freight Engine of the Metropolitan Railway Company.

Moved by Councillor Hill seconded by Councillor Innes,

Whereas by virtue of an agreement made by the County of York with the Metropolitan Railway Co. the said Railway is giving a freight and passenger service on Yonge St. The passenger service is excellent, but the freight service is confined to package and broken bulk. In order, therefore, that this County should enjoy the advantage of a railway competition that was intended by its representatives when such charter was granted to said railway, it is necessary that connection be made with the leading trunk lines of this Country;

And whereas the Metropolitan Railway have applied to the Railway Committee of the Privy Council for permission to connect their line with the Canadian Pacific Railway at North Toronto;

Be it therefore resolved that we support the application of the Metropolitan Railway Company to make such connection so that this, as well as other municipalities, may enjoy the privilege of connection with the leading railways of this country, and that the Reeve and the Clerk sign the same, and that a copy be forwarded to the Hon. Wm. Mulock, M. P., requesting him to do all that is possible to see that the same is granted.—Carried.

The Reeve reported that in obedience to the resolution passed at the last meeting of the council he called on the president of the Metropolitan street Railway Company and made known to him the purport of the resolution and received from Mr. Warren the following letter in answer to the proposition of this council:—

Toronto, Oct. 25, 1899.  
P. G. Savage, Esq. Reeve, Richmond Hill.

DEAR SIR,—Replying to the resolution of your council, and your letter of 23rd inst. regarding commutation tickets and desiring our cars to stop at Centre street, we have given this matter very careful consideration and are anxious to meet the wishes of your council.

It will be inconvenient to make a regular stopping place at Centre St., at the same time we will endeavor to have our cars stop at this point when passengers are waiting or when there are passengers to get off there.

In regard to commutation tickets we will issue (it being thoroughly understood that our doing so is at the request of your Council) commutation tickets for parties residing in Richmond Hill and having their regular business in Toronto, at a rate of 30 round trip tickets at 30 cents each, the said tickets to be good only for 15 weeks.

Either of these arrangements are subject to cancellation at any time should the Company find it necessary in their interests to do so.
