CANADA A NATION.

The Second Special Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment, as the Transvaal contingent is officially styled, is already several days out on its four weeks' voyage to Cape Town. It was with a sigh of relief almost when the final farewells were said. Never in the history of the Dominion have the inmost feelings of the nation been so deeply stirred, for never before have the conditions existed to create so intense a sentiment of personal and national patriotism. For the first time Canada has been given the opportunity of taking her place as an integral portion of the Empire, and she has seized the opportunity in a manner that admits of no ambiguous interpretation. She realizes today as she never has before that she is indeed a nation, called upon not only to enjoy all the privileges, but to assume the heavy responsibilities, of that status.

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier returned from the Jubilee proclaiming to the country that she had reached the standing of a nation, and was so regarded at the headquarters of the Empire, there were, even in the ranks of those who claimed to be leaders of the people, men who so little understood the significance of his declaration, that they attempted to ridicule it. But the Premier knew whereof he spoke. He was able to look ahead and realize what progressive statesmanship would bring to Canada. He had faith in the policy his Government was prepared to inaugurate; he had faith in the country that was to respond to that policy; he had faith in the people who had placed power in his hands; and to-day the most uncompromising sceptic is compelled to admit that the Premier's claim for Canadian nationality has been sustained under condition far more onerous than ever he had foreseen in those days of Jubilee rejoicing.

Late war news confirm the previous reports that the British have secured another victory over the Boers around Ladysmith and Colenso. The British loss was 8 killed and 20 wounded, while it is said that the enemy suffered heavily in killed and wounded, some dispatches placing the number at two thousand. The infantry under General White stormed a strong position held by the Boers, and assisted by cavalry almost annihilated their opponents at this place. The news during the past few days is most cheering and it is thought that the brave general may yet completely retrieve his reputation and eventually emerge from his dangerous position with honor and credit to himself and his men.
