NEWS FROM CANADA'S TROOPS.

The question of keeping the people of Canada posted about the Canadian troops has been solved by the Family Herald and Weekly Star of Montreal, sending a special war correspondent, who sailed on the Sardinian and whose sole business will be to keep the Family Herald in touch with the troops in action. The Family Herald's correspondent goes thoroughly equipped for his work. He has a photographic outfit, will be mounted on the field and will have a mounted orderly. The Family Herald's correspondent goes by permission of Dr. Borden, Minister of Militia, and with instructions specially cabled from the War Office by the Secretary of War.

RAILWAY CONNECTION.

A committee of the County Council met on Monday and discussed the proposed Metropolitan Railway connection with the C. P. R. at North Toronto. The members of the County Council present were Warden Woodcock, Councillors Evans, Pugsley, Gibson, Fisher, Stokes, Hartman, High and Johnston. The Metropolitan was represented by Messrs. C. D. Warren, J. W. Moyes and Walter Barwick, and Mayor Davis and Mr. Ellis appeared on behalf of the town of North Toronto. The two last named opposed the idea of carrying freight on Yonge St. After the pros. and cons. had been heard the Warden and Councillor Evans were appointed a committee to go to Ottawa the following day and recommend the Railway Committee of the Privy Council to grant the following: (1) That the connection between the Metropolitan and the C. P. R. be made. (2) That the company be allowed to run three freight cars in addition to the motor, and to run two more if the traffic required. (3) That the company be allowed to run their freight trains at a speed of 15 miles per hour in the country districts and 6 miles per hour through incorporated towns and villages, including Thornhill. The members of the Council who opposed this proposition were Gibson High and Hartman.

WHEN THE MAPLES TURN.

Some of the stories are very funny and all of them good, and the illustrations are by Howard, Sam Hunter, Carl Ahrens, W. Goods, Innes, Kilvert, Gordon and Cuallener.
