THE WORLD AND THE METROPOLITAN RAILWAY.

THE LIBERAL has no desire to continue a controversy with the Toronto World. Neither has it any inclination to fight the battles of the Metropolitan Railway. We have stated time and again that the company is capable of giving the public a better service and at a lower price. But because it has not done everything that travellers could wish, should it not get some credit for what it has accomplished for the benefit of the public. The Metropolitan, between Toronto and Newmarket, furnishes accommodation which a few years ago seemed only like a dream, and people all along the line are willing to express their appreciation of the visitor passing their doors nearly every hour in the day. Metropolitan cars are a great convenience, and are undoubtedly a real benefit to the County of York as a whole.

The World of Monday again maintains that the Metropolitan Company should be compelled by the Legislature to carry passengers at a cent a mile, and that journal calls upon THE LIBERAL to urge the local members to move in that direction. We would certainly like to see lower rates, but as long as competing lines of steam railways are allowed by law to charge three cents a mile, we cannot see that it would be justice to take the Metropolitan by the throat and say, "you must carry passengers at just one-third the rate charged by your competitors." If all lines are lowered to two or one cent a mile, as the case may be, the Metropolitan will not have the same reason to complain of partiality.

The World still harps on the Metropolitan getting right-of-way to the Union Station and the St. Lawrence Market, and speaks as if people up this way are opposed to such a proposal. Not at all. We endeavored for years to get the right-of-way, but the city and Toronto Street Railway would never consent. We are all anxious to get to the heart of the city without change of cars, but places situated as Richmond Hill, is also desire connection with a railway such as the C. P. R., so that coal and other freight may be brought to the people's doors.

At a meeting of the Board of Education on Monday the majority of the members present seemed to be in favor of engaging a third teacher for the High School. THE LIBERAL would be pleased to favor the proposition, but before the question is finally settled we think that the Board should publish a statement showing as nearly as possible the extra cost a third teacher will mean. It is generally better to make haste slowly.

There has been little news of a startling nature from South Africa since last issue. No severe fighting has been reported since the Modder River engagement, but late bulletins show that the bombardment of Ladysmith by the Boers has been vigorous. The Canadian contingent has been brigaded with two other strong companies which means that ere long they will be in the thick of the fight.

A by-law appointing A. B. Armstrong of Toronto, solicitor of this township was passed, and also a by-law appointing a place to hold the nomination of municipal councillors and to select polling stations and deputy-returning officers for 1900 was also passed.

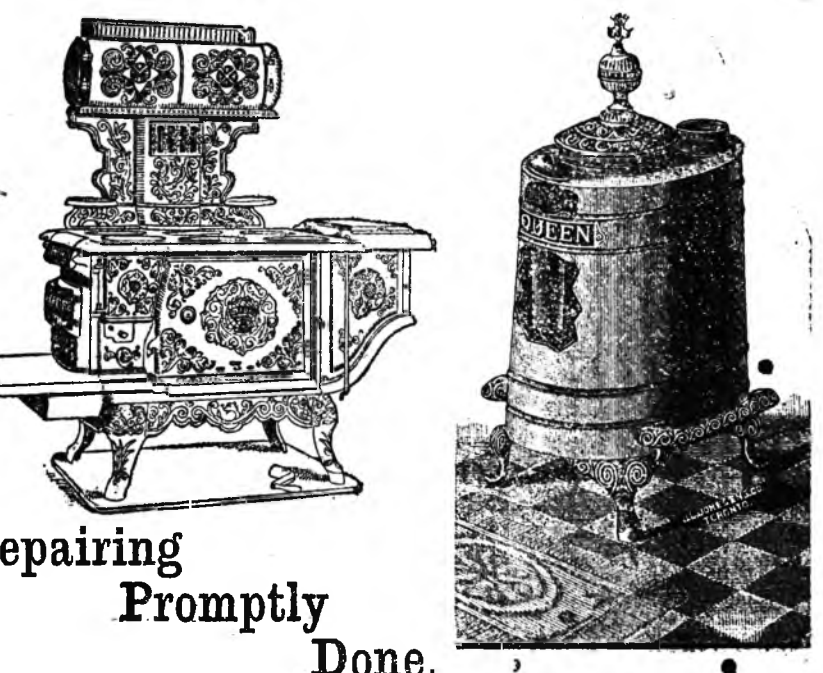
