lands of Canada are rejoicing in the fact that last season's crops were a record, there is every indication that, like its immediate predecessor, it can only hold the record until next harvest. Already preparations for next season's crops are well in hand, and it may safely be predicted that the crop area throughout the west next season will be a substantial increase on previous records. Figures have been prepared by Mr. John Osborne, General Superintendent of the Western Division of the Canadian Pacific, who places the total area of plowing at 867,070 acres, an increase of 253,300 acres, or 40 per cent. over that of last year. The total area now ready for the spring crop is 1,492,088 acres, an increase over last gift. spring of 480,630 acres, or nearly 50 per cent., and Mr. Osborne has been informed on good authority that still months past. more plowing will be done in the spring, thus materially increasing the percentage.


