County Council.

The County Commissioners reported last week that no reasonable offer had been made for the old Court House building.

Committees for the year were appointed as follows:—

- Finance—Fisher, Norman, Gardhouse, Boag, Chester, Johnston.
- Bylaws and Legislation—Evans, Pugsley, Gibson, Lundy, High, Gardhouse.
- County Property—Baker, Ley, High, Stokes, Johnston.
- Printing—Woodcock, Hall, Norman, Lundy, Chester, Hartman.
- Education—Hartman, Hall, Gibson, Ley, Woodcock.
- Equalization—Hall, Boag, Evans, Baker, Fisher, Ley, Woodcock, Stokes, Pugsley.

The Council on Thursday voted \$100 to the National Patriotic Fund, and \$50 each to the County's representatives on the second contingent. A grant of \$100 was also made to the Hospital for Sick Children.

Ex-Wardens Stokes and Davidson and Judge McDougall were appointed a Board of Audit for the year.

Messrs. Gardhouse and Pugsley were appointed representatives on the Industrial Exhibition Association Board.

The election of County Commissioners resulted in the appointment of Councillors Johnson and Hartman.

Councillor Norman's resolution regarding the supervision of electric railways was adopted after some discussion. As adopted it reads:—That the Committee on Legislation prepare and submit to the Council for approval at this session a memorial of the Ontario Legislature they will enact such legislation in regard to electric railways as will fully safeguard the rights of the people in their highways, and provide against the creation of monopolies in local transportation; that a commission on board of arbitration, with power to enforce its decisions, be appointed, to whom shall be referred all matters of dispute in relation to fares, freight rates, services connections, etc., that when the stock in an electric railway requires a value beyond the outlay of the investors the rates for passengers and shippers be so reduced as to approximate the natural value of the service.

On Tuesday Councillor Pugsley gave notice of a motion to petition the Local Legislature to amend the law so that towns separating from counties should not benefit from the county high school grants unless they contributed to the High School fund at the same rate as other municipalities in the county.

Messrs. John Boag and R. J. Gibson were elected Industrial Home Commissioners by acclamation.

The report of the Industrial Home Commissioners stated that the institution was crowded, there being 110 inmates.

Herbert Baker, Whitechurch, was appointed the county student at the Guelph Agricultural College for the term commencing next October.

A committee composed of Messrs. Evans, Woodcock, Pugsley, Hartman, Stokes, High, Gibson, Chester, Hall and Lundy was appointed, vested with full powers, to deal with matters of dispute with the Metropolitan Railway Company, during the time the Council is not in session.
