THROWN FROM HIS CUTTER.

Mr. Wm. Dennis, a butcher well-known throughout the county, whose place of business is 1085 Yonge Street, Toronto, was thrown from his cutter Tuesday afternoon at the Patterson corner, a mile west of Richmond Hill, and got a pretty severe shaking up. Mr. Dennis drove up to Mr. Thomas Bowes', Concord, on Monday evening, and remained over night. Tuesday morning he drove north to buy cattle in King township. Returning from Maple afterwards he was driving at a lively gait around the corner at the cross-roads when the cutter slid off track and he was thrown out with force. As he is a man weighing 240 lbs., he fell heavily. His head and face were cut and bruised, and when found shortly afterwards by some one travelling along that way he was in a critical condition. He was driven to the home of Mr. Aaron Prentice, thence by Mr. Isaac Snider to Mr. Bowes', and afterwards taken to his home. FENIAN RAID MEDAL.

One of our citizens, Mr. D. McKenzie, has just received a medal and clasp for services at the time of the Fenian Raid in 1866, nearly 34 years ago. Mr. McKenzie, who was in active service six months, belonged at the time to Port Rowan Rifle Company, and was stationed at the town of Paris. The medal came by mail direct from Col. Tisdale, our citizen not being able to go to Simcoe a few days ago when the presentation of a large number of medals took place. The trophy is made of sterling silver from the Royal Mint, and is about the size of a silver dollar. On one side is the word "Canada," surrounded by a wreath of maple leaves with the Canadian flag in the centre. On the other side are the words, "Victoria Regina Et Imperatrix," and the recipient's name, rank and company are engraved in the circular edge. Mr. McKenzie's connection with the Port Rowan Company was purely accidental. His home was in this section of country, but being on a visit to a married sister he enlisted with the volunteers and went on duty. He has reason to look upon this as the visit of his life, as it not only gave him the opportunity to serve his country, but when he returned he brought with him his wife, who is still spared to look after his household affairs, and share his joys and sorrows.

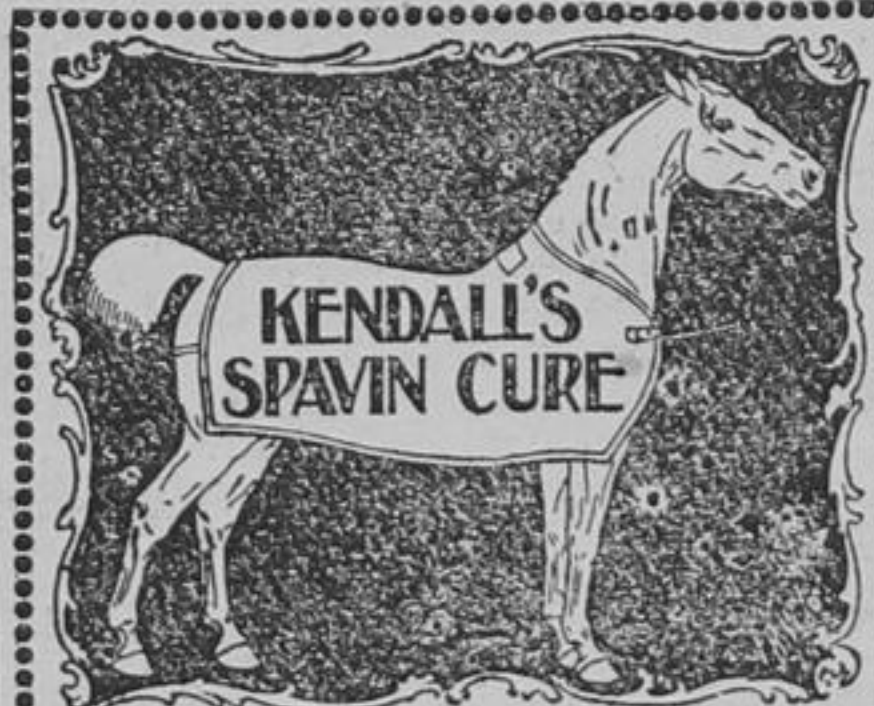
