ALL CORRECT BUT —

The Toronto World on Wednesday of last week contained the following news items from the Richmond Hill correspondent who usually displays more blind zeal than good judgment in his efforts, as he says, to "boom the town":—

1. "The residence of Mrs. M. Barker on Centre Street has been purchased by Rev. Mr. Simpson, who was a former pastor here. The purchase price was about \$700."

2. "The Village Council met Tuesday night and closed the Patriotic Fund."

3. "At a meeting of the Board of Education on Monday, Miss Keith of Sturgeon Falls was engaged at a salary of \$250."

4. "A quiet home wedding was celebrated on Monday night at the residence of the bride's father, Mr. John Savage, on the second of Markham. The contracting parties were Miss Mary Savage and Mr. Jacob Raymond."

Relative to No. 1, Rev. Mr. Simpson was at one time an honored pastor here, but we are in a position to say that he has neither purchased the said residence for \$700, nor at any other price.

No. 2 could not be correct as the Council passed the by-law donating \$25 to the Patriotic Fund only on Monday evening of this week.

No. 3 is correct with the exception that Miss Keith will be glad to learn she is engaged as teacher in the second department of the public school not at a salary of \$250 but \$275.

With regard to item No. 4 The World was not altogether wrong, as the wedding referred to did take place, but the bride's father lives on the 2nd of Vaughan, his daughter's name is Florence Ida May, and the groomsmen is Mr. Reaman.

With all sincerity we say that The World correspondent should be more careful in the items of news. They may seem harmless in themselves, but to say the least it is often annoying to our citizens, when they visit neighboring towns and villages, to be compelled to contradict absurd statements as the items are often copied by the county papers.

The story is told that, once upon a time, a man gave the following definition for a lobster. "A lobster is a fish, red in color, which usually walks backwards." "Yes," said a bystander, "the definition is quite correct, except that a lobster is not a fish, it is not red in color, and it does not usually walk backwards."

As a rule the Richmond Hill items as they appear in The World are about as correct as the above definition.

There was tremendous cheering in the House of Commons on Friday last when Mr. Fielding made his annual financial statement. Mr. Innes introduced By-Law No. 176 to authorize a grant of \$25 in aid of the Patriotic Fund. The by-law was read a first, second and third time and passed.

The Council adjourned.

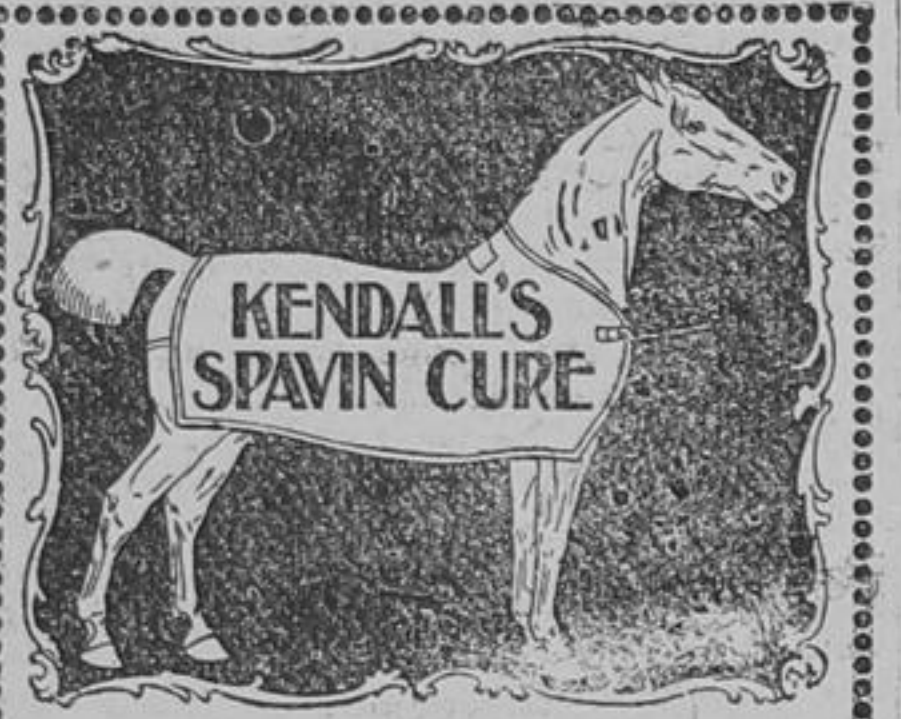
