RICHMOND HILL, May 10, 1900

A deputation of farmers interviewed the Ontario Government while the House was in session a few weeks ago, and urged upon the members the necessity of a revision of the list of Justices of the Peace for the province. The deputation had no difficulty in showing that the roll contains the names of many men who were appointed as far back as 1863, and not a few of them are long since dead. It is to be hoped the Government will look carefully into the matter and revise the lists, as doubtless in every county there are men on the roll who are physically and mentally incapable of properly discharging their duties. In such cases new appointments should be made, and men should be selected with the greatest of care.

The Budget speech recently delivered in the House of Commons by Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, makes very pleasant reading. The speaker showed the total trade of the Dominion for the past 30 years by means of a diagram, and this mode of comparing the years was a complete success. The Hon gentleman seemed to have little difficulty in showing that the Dominion had just closed the most prosperous year in its history. The trade for the past four years was given as follows: 1896, \$239,025,360; 1897, \$257,168,862; 1898, \$304,475,736; 1899, \$321,661,213.

The South African campaign under Lord Roberts as Commander-in-Chief is being planned in such a way that the Boers have become powerless before the British forces. The enemy has made stubborn resistance in several places during the past week, but in every case it seems that they have been forced to retire. Acts of bravery and heroism are reported time and again, and it is cheering to know that the Canadians are keeping well to the front.

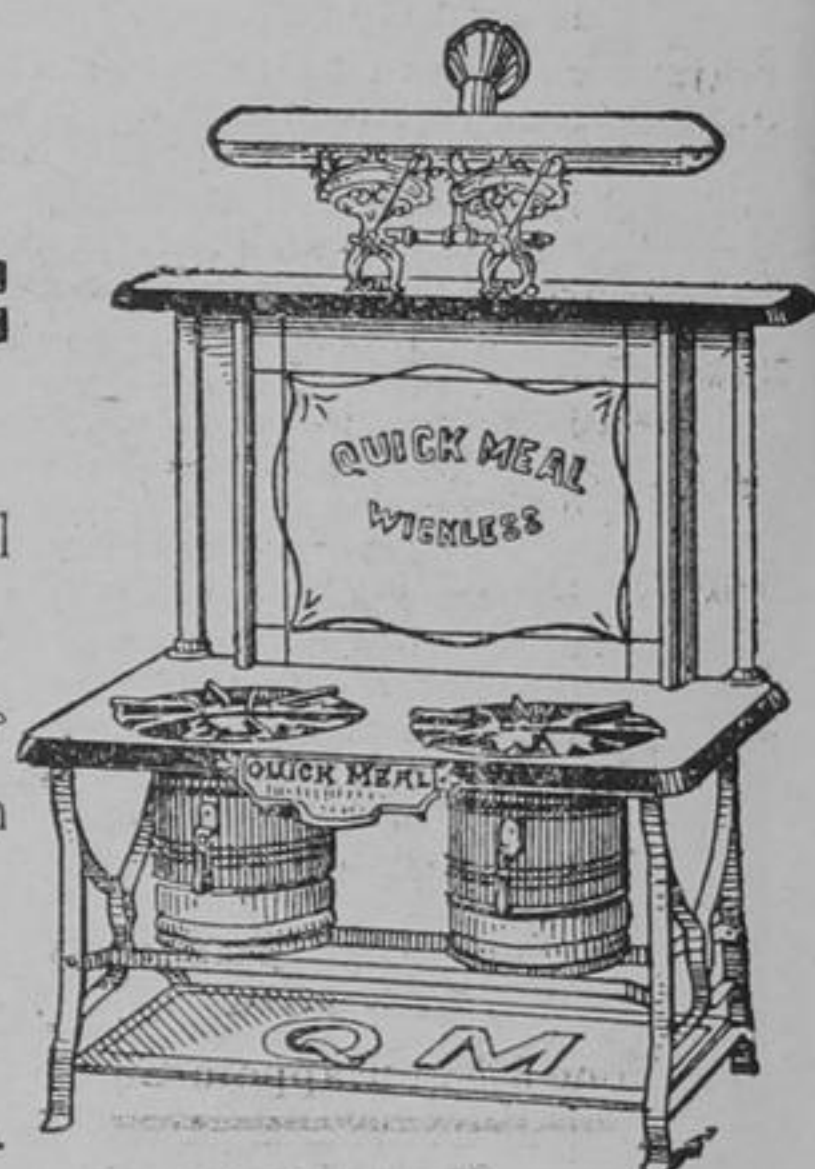
