SURRENDER OF PRETORIA.

Despatches during the night. brought good news, and there is little doubt the South African war is over. Kruger has fled, and the surrender of Johannesburg was quickly followed by that of Pretoria. Everybody rejoices at the prospects of peace and an end to bloodshed.

One of those pleasant little incidents which happen all too seldom in the political history of the Dominion, occurred on Tuesday afternoon of last week when the House of Commons, laying aside all party differences for the moment, united in tendering cordial congratulations to Sir Charles Tupper on the occasion of his completing the 45th year of his public dife. The veteran leader's desk in the Chamber was decorated with a huge bouquet of roses and ferns, and as he entered the House he was greeted with rounds of applause from both Z. Both parties, therefore, are anxious that the organization be made as perfect as possible for their side. Every prediction of the improvement which Liberals said a change would bring about has been verified far beyond the most sanguine expectations of the Government's warmest supporter, and if the calm, deliberate judgment which every man seeks to apply to the management of his own private affairs is callowed to influence his action at the ballot box the outcome of the next. general election is a foregone conclusion.


