An unflinching sign that the last hours of the session are upon us made its appearance in the House of Commons the other day, when Mr. Foster presented his stereotyped criticism of the Government's financial policy and asked the House to vote want of confidence in the Administration. There was nothing particularly new in the speech with which the ex-Finance minister presented his resolution. He travelled by a general dulatory sort of way all over the field of political criticism, charged the Government with breaking every ante-election promise, with increasing taxation, the public debt, and the national expenditure, with expending money in royal commissions, granting railway subsidies, and a good deal more which has been explained and justified a score of times already, not only to the satisfaction of the ministerialists in the House, but also, we believe, to the satisfaction of the country.
