DON'T DEFY THE LAW.

The majority of citizens in most municipalities are anxious to have the laws of the country observed. To render assistance in enforcing the laws, however, is quite a different thing. People shrink from having anything to do with liquor cases, and this was evident at the magistrate's court held here on Tuesday. To lay a charge before the license inspector and then fail to appear to substantiate the charge is quite a common occurrence.

It is to be hoped that in future the law relative to furnishing liquor to certain persons forbidden to get it, will be thoroughly understood here. Those who furnish liquor to such persons are liable to a fine the same as the hotel-keeper who sells it. The acting magistrates said at the trial that after the recent publicity a person accused of the same offence would scarcely be excused by pleading ignorance of the law in this district.

THE LIBERAL, like many others, would like to refrain from referring to such disagreeable matters where friends and neighbors are implicated, and we sincerely wish we could hope that our citizens would make up their minds to observe the laws of the land.

"ONE MAN ONE VOTE."

The Globe of Saturday showed that the coming elections in the cities and urban districts will be fought under conditions quite different to what they have been many years past. Under the Dominion franchise Act, which has been repealed by the Government now in power, there was no restriction as to the number of votes an elector might cast, provided he possessed the property qualification in different ridings. Naturally, this provision of the law was taken advantage of in many cases, and hundreds of men voted in ridings, where they never were the bona fide owners of a foot of land.

Under the existing law the principle of "one man one vote" prevails, and the result of its operation is found in the fact that in St. Matthew's Ward, which is part of East York for Dominion purposes, the voter's list, which formerly contained 3,314 names, now has less than 1,800, although the actual population of the ward has materially increased in the meantime. The difference represents the non-resident vote which has been eliminated. In West York the number struck off on account of the non-resident vote will be even greater than in the east, and there will be more uncertainty than usual about the next elections.

The Toronto Evening News, a few days ago, appeared to be very much pained as it told its readers that "Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte will address the electors of St. Hyacinthe on Sunday." The Newmarket Express was also very much shocked at hearing such news, and sarcastically remarked: "Isn't it nice to have a Premier that won't break the Sabbath, even by going to church?" The World of Monday, however, contained a "special" from Montreal which read as follows: "The reports to the effect that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Mr. Tarte would speak at St. Hyacinthe on Sunday proved unfounded." If br'er McKay of The Express is as honest as his face would indicate he will tell his readers this week that the Premier is not quite as bad as he last week pictured him.

The Markham Sun referring to the probability of a general election this fall says:—"The question of tariff no longer enters into the campaign. It would seem that the only question that the electorate will be called upon to decide will be, has the present government been as economical as their predecessors and has it been characterized by as good executive ability?" The electorate should be able to decide the question without very much difficulty.
