

The speaker took up the prohibition question. He had, he said, fought for prohibition for many years. Personally he believed it would be a grand thing for Canada. The Liberals had promised a plebiscite of the Dominion, but had never promised prohibition unless the plebiscite justified it. He had had high hopes of the result of who is spending a few weeks on this that vote; he had gone about the country advocating prohibition, and the result of the vote had been a very great disappointment to him, as well as to all sincere prohibitionists. A small vote was polled, divided almost equally. It would not have been right for a Government to introduce a prohibitory measure on such a showing, and no Parliament would have supported it. The proof of this lay in the fact that, immediately after the vote, many prohibitionists declared that prohibition was impossible, and it was only some time after that the agitation again arose.
