FRATERNITY.**

What nobler object could any patriotic party desire to emblazon on its banners than that offered by Sir Wilfrid at Sohmer Park the other day:—"Union, Peace, Friendship, Fraternity"? Union of all the diversified elements of our population, which must be harmoniously blended into one great Canadian nationality if we are ever to adequately fulfil our destiny; Peace within our commercial borders, that under the continued benign influence of an assured stability of tariff and other trade conditions, our merchants and manufacturers, our miners and agriculturists, may go forward in confidence to take the fullest advantage of the unequalled opportunities offering on every hand; Friendship with our neighbors to the south, with whom we are and always must be in close contact and relationship social and commercial; Fraternity with the empire, ever fostering and strengthening those bonds of brotherhood which have received such development since the present Government assumed office. The Liberal party has, by right of its record, every justification in assuming such a motto, and there is no man in the empire to-day who has greater right to appropriate it as his battle-cry, than Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

**A SAMPLE OF THE WORK.**

No more useful regulation has been put into operation under this Government than that which provided for the appointing of inspectors of Canadian exports at the points both of departure and arrival. The dishonesty of one or two unprincipled shippers, combined with the inexperience of a few incompetent packers, has wrought incalculable harm to Canada's reputation in the markets of the old world, for it was manifestly useless for the Government's agents or the individual shipper, to endeavor to introduce Canadian apples, for example, when a former shipment contained two or three barrels stuffed in the centre with rubbish. The duties of the inspectors include the examination of shipments of agricultural, animal and fruit products before they leave Canada and upon their arrival in England, to watch the state of the British market, to note where improvement can be made in the methods of packing and transportation, and generally to help forward in a thoroughly practical manner the interests of this section of Canada's trade with the old land. This is but a sample of the vast amount of practical legislation which has been quietly put into operation by the Government, with immense advantage to the community at large.

Certainly, there is a good reason. Four years ago the Liberals supported him because he assisted them in ousting Sir Charles Tupper from the premiership. They will oppose him now because he is endeavoring to restore Sir Charles to his former position.

Speaking at the McCarthy convention in North Simcoe the other day, Col. O'Brien—one of the cleanest and most highly respected men who ever sat in Parliament, referred to the despicable personal attacks being made upon Ministers of the Crown in this campaign, and made a point which cannot but appear to every fair minded elector. He remarked that Mr. Sifton having bought a house in Ottawa, it was immediately stated he was corrupt. Sir Charles was the only man in public life, he said, that he knew of, that had come out rich, and therefore he must be corrupt. That would not be fair, perhaps, but it was as fair as the charge against Mr. Sifton. When so much loose talk is indulged in by Oppositionists with regard to the personal probity of prominent Liberals, it seems necessary to emphasize the fact that not a suspicion even has been verified.

The World of Monday in its "Political Intelligence" column says that "In nearly every Liberal weekly was seen last week an article condemning the member for West York." The World leaves the public in the dark as to why Hon. N. C. Wallace is being condemned. If weekly papers are censuring Mr. Wallace without cause they ought to be exposed. 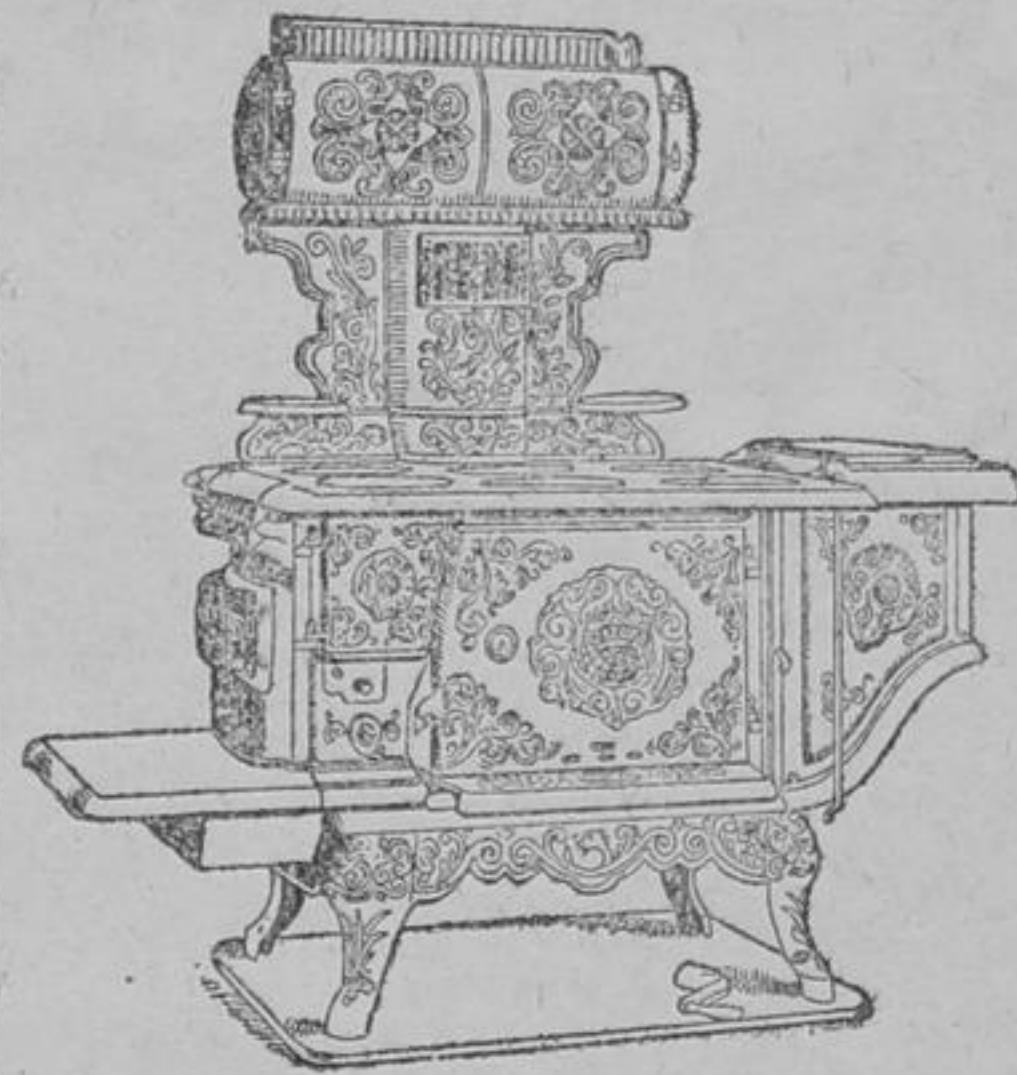

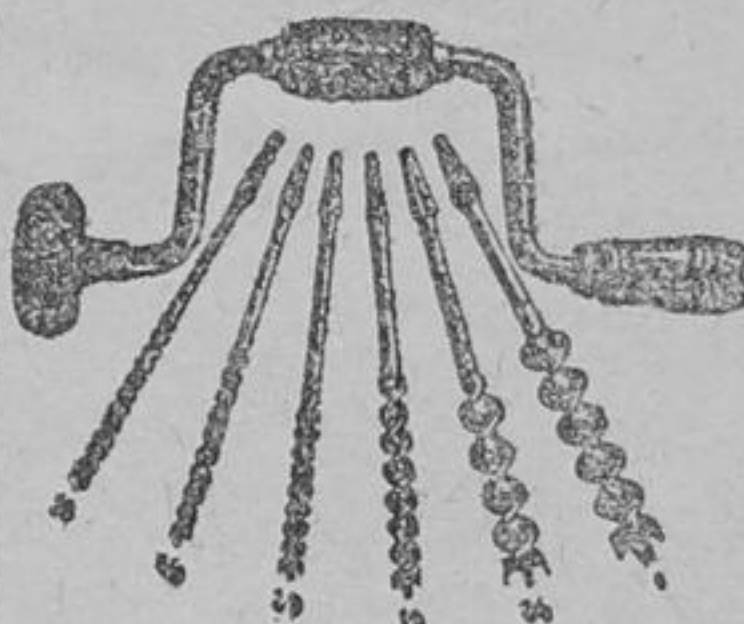
