without costs, which the parties ac-
cepted.

Kerswell vs. McQuarrie.—Balance
on note \$48.28. Judgment for \$39.28,
\$29.28 to be paid in 30 days, balance of
\$10 to stand, as there was a dispute
about a calf which defendant sold to
plaintiff's son.

Woods vs. Murphy.—Balance of
wages \$22.50. Plaintiff claimed that
he left defendant's place before his
contract expired owing to illness. Judgment
for \$22 and costs, to be paid
by the 1st of November.
