**THE FARMERS, THE LIBERALS,
HUGH JOHN'S SPEECH AND
THE CONSERVATIVES.**

Mr. W. F. Maclean, editor-in-chief of the Toronto World, gives a double column article in his own paper on Monday, on the trade question, over his own signature, and under the above heading. In this remarkable production Mr. Maclean boasts, as he always does, of being in favor of putting high duties on all imports from foreign countries, and says that the Conservative party, led by Sir Charles Tupper, is sworn to high protection. The singular part is that while The World contends that the Conservative leaders are thoroughly united in their policy, Mr. Maclean in the same article quotes from a speech delivered a few days ago in Manitoba by Mr. Hugh John Macdonald, showing that "the son of his father" pledged himself, if elected, to use his best efforts in wiping out all the duty on agricultural implements. The pledge given by Hugh John and printed in The World is as follows:

"If elected as a representative of Brandon, he would pledge himself to use whatever influence he had to have the entire duty removed from agricultural implements. This was a distinct pledge, and he intended to carry it out."

THE LIBERAL fails to see how the leader of the party, Sir Charles Tupper, and his running mate, Mr. Hugh John Macdonald, can have two distinct declarations on the same question, but Mr. Maclean and The World seems to think it all right if votes can be got in that way.

East York's late member says: "We have no great apology for Hugh John Macdonald and his declaration for lower duties on agricultural implements," but "while the Conservative party is bound to stand by protection to Canadian manufacturers, it is not surprising that Hugh John Macdonald was forced to declare his individual opinion in favor of free implements in order to expose the duplicity and dishonesty of Laurier and Sifton."

Did any person ever listen to worse twaddle than this, and from one with the pretensions of a statesman? Mr. Maclean has no apology to make for Hugh John if the latter can deceive the electors of Brandon and catch some votes. What can one member of a party do on any question when it is known that his leader and all his colleagues are against him. This is the worst kind of deception that a politician could be guilty of.

Mr. Maclean claims in the same article that The Weekly Sun and the farmers are dissatisfied with the Laurier Government because "the Liberals have failed to make good their pledge to reduce the customs tax on their agricultural implements, their binder twine, their coal oil, and the like, and therefore were guilty of every day deception." Mr. Maclean has again blundered, as they have greatly reduced the duty on many articles, and have placed binder twine on the free list.

But this does not matter. Mr. Maclean says: "There is no other thing open to the farmers than to drive out of office the party that promised to free them from what they were led to believe was an unjust tax." Does Mr. Maclean think the farmers are a pack of fools? Why should the farmers turn out a party that has lowered the duties considerably, and return to power a class of men whom Mr. Maclean says, "boldly declare that they are, and always were, protectionists, and intend to be so in the future."

THE SUN BACKS UP MACLEAN.

The Markham Sun is quite excited over the alleged resignation of Mr. W. F. Maclean, former M. P. for East York. The Sun says: "The primary cause of this course of action on the part of Mr. Maclean is said to be the refusal of the Liberal Conservatives of St. Matthew's Ward to ratify the nomination of Mr. Maclean as the candidate in the forthcoming struggle."

The Sun further states, editorially, that "the cause of his resignation arose out of some difficulty between the Executive of Ward No. 1, led by John Greer, arising originally from the fact that Maclean voted against the Remedial Bill on the Manitoba school question. John Greer, however, must be a bundle of ignorance if he has not yet learned to accept the voice of overwhelming majority. He must be taught forthwith that he does not own the people. Such absurd ignorance will only add to Maclean's popularity and relegate John Greer to dumb forgetfulness. The 'people's Billy' will again be their unanimous choice in spite of John Greer or any other Czar."

Mr. Maclean's alleged unpopularity in St. Matthew's Ward cannot be owing to his vote on the Remedial Bill, as his stand on that question was approved by the great majority of electors in Ontario. There are other forces at work within the Conservative party who are anxious to defeat Mr. Maclean, and these forces are led by The Mail and Empire, which always refers to him as "the man with the knife."

MR. MASSEY SUPPORTS THE GOVERNMENT.

The World of Monday declares the Laurier Government has entered into an alliance with Mr. Walter Massey, President of the Massey-Harris Company, because Mr. Massey has said he is prepared to support the present Government. The following paragraph is taken from Mr. Massey's letter, quoted in The World: "As is generally known, politics are not in my line. I am, however, an independent supporter of the present Government. While not subscribing to their policy in its entirety, I believe the Laurier Government have rendered the country magnificent service, and should undoubtedly be returned; and I have confidence that with the experience gained during the present term they will be prepared to administer the affairs of state in a thoroughly satisfactory manner. I shall, therefore, support the Government."

On Monday of last week a member of the Board of Education gave notice that at the next meeting he would move that a third teacher be engaged for the High School. Personally, THE LIBERAL is in favor of such a move, but we would like to know the feeling of the ratepayers before they are asked to pay heavier taxes. Would it not be well to have an expression of opinion before the step is taken? If there is no protest the trustees will have reason to think the proposal is popular. THE LIBERAL is always open for discussions on such important subjects.

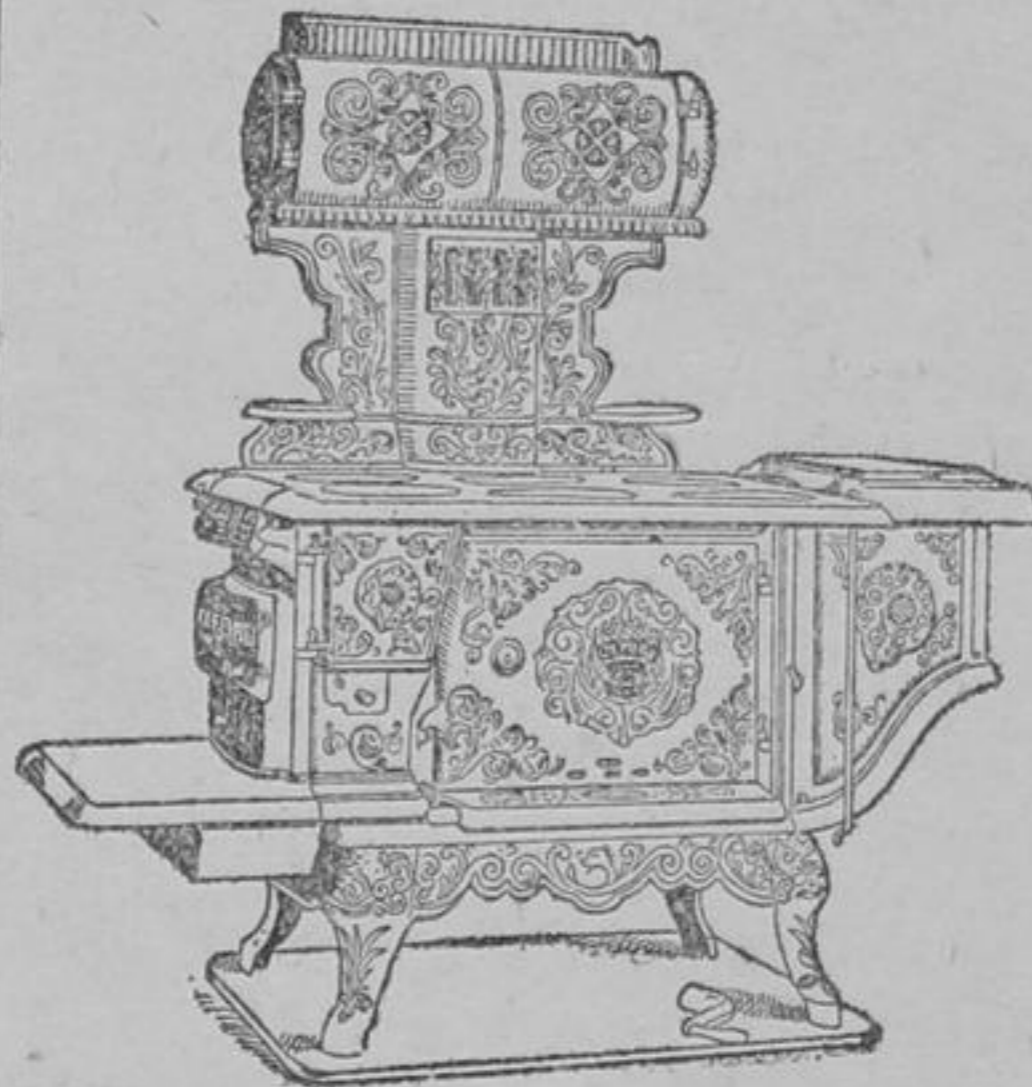

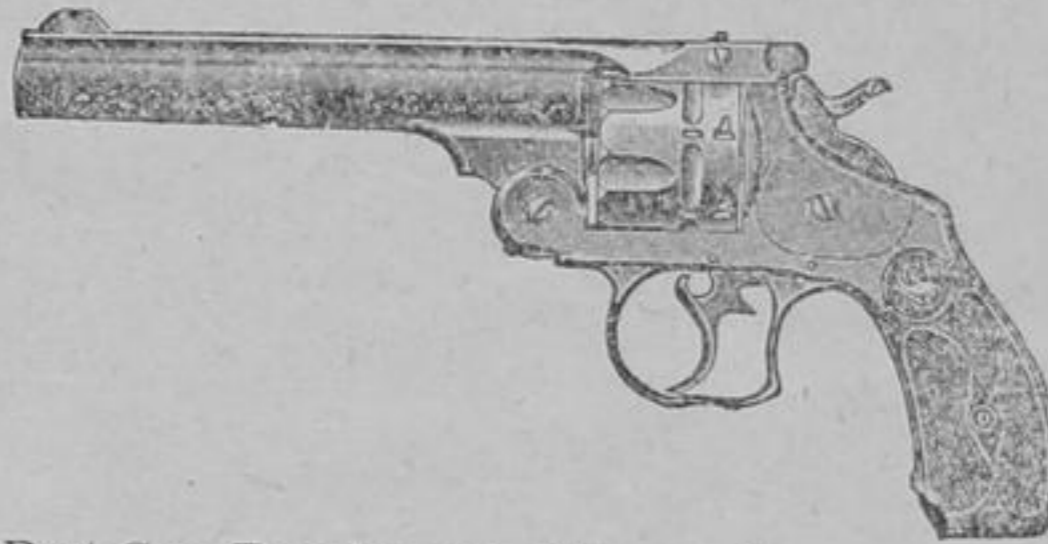

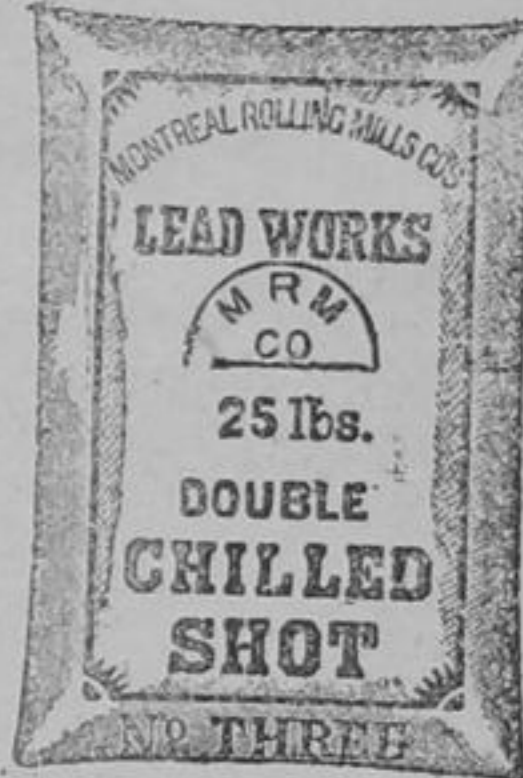
