THEN AND NOW.

The Globe of Monday points out that for sending the Canadian contingents to take part in a foreign war there was only one precedent. This was in 1885 when Great Britain had on her hands an ugly conflict with hordes of fanatics in Egypt. At that time the offer of a contingent fully equipped was received and accepted from New South Wales. The British Government communicated to Canada on the same lines, but the answer was of the most discouraging description. They were told that the Canadian Government was "ready to sanction recruiting by Canada for service in Egypt or elsewhere," but that the whole expense must be borne by the home Government. On those terms the contingent was If Sir Wilfrid not accepted. Laurier's Government had taken this incident as a precedent no contingent would have been sent to South Africa. The refusal in 1885 was under a Conservative Government led by Sir John Macdonald, and in that case there was no charge of disloyalty.


