The annual meeting of the Curling Club was held in the Council Chamber Saturday evening Dec. 1, 1900. The auditors' report of the secretary's and the treasurer's books showed there were last year 31 members, and that the treasurer had on hand a balance of \$3.93. The report was adopted. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretaries were appointed a committee to wait on the Village Council relative to renting the rink for the coming curling season, securing if possible Tuesday and Thursday nights. The joining fee was placed at \$1.00 and the secretary was instructed to get printed 50 members' tickets.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Eleven of the twelve trustees were present at the Board meeting on Monday. Mr. Clubine being the absent member. A report from Inspector Davidson showed that every department of the Public School was in excellent condition. Miss Keith, who had at a former meeting requested an advance in salary, which was not entertained, asked for a testimonial. On motion the request for a testimonial was granted. The secretary's bill for postage, \$1.90, and supplies, \$3.50, was ordered to be paid. Mr. Sanderson, in accordance with a former notice of motion, moved that the Board make provision for engaging a third teacher for the High School at the beginning of the year. Mr. Switzer seconded the motion on condition that the principal's salary be \$800, 1st assistant \$600, and 2nd assistant \$450. The mover and seconder gave several reasons for the stand taken, and thought that with the likely increase in attendance that would follow a third teacher, the tax would be very little more than at present. Trustees McConaghy, Naughton, McNair, McDonald, Newton and Boyle spoke in opposition to the resolution, contending that such a move would not be advisable at the present time. The school is doing good work under two teachers. Messrs. P. G. Savage, H. A. Nicholls, W. H. Pugsley, J. Palmer, A. Moodie, T. F. McMahon and other ratepayers also opposed the proposition to increase the staff just now. When the resolution was put only the mover and seconder held up their hands in favor of it.
