The last of the elections have been held, and once more the wretched incendiary racial cry has uttered failed as it deserves. In spite of the persistent efforts of Tory politicians, who wilfully and deliberately misrepresented the attitude of Quebec, and notwithstanding Sir Hibbert Tupper's reckless onslaught in reference to the Yukon the electors of Burrard and of Yale and Cariboo, have given renewed and emphasized support to the Government. Thus the last vestige of excuse for continuing the suicidal effort to set section against section and race against race, has gone, and it may surely now be hoped that the senseless policy will be dropped.

Monday's World says that in an interview with Mr. W. F. Maclean, M. P., that gentleman has named three Liberals from East York to fill the vacancies for senatorships. Mr. Maclean says "If any letter from me would bring the name of some worthy farmer Liberal before the attention of Sir Wilfrid Laurier I would gladly write it." It is extremely kind (?) of Mr. Maclean to offer to do so much for the farmer Liberals of East York, but doubtless he would be a greater success pulling mangel wurtzels.

The magnificent banquet tendered Hon. Clifford Sifton in the Pavilion, Tuesday, was well deserved by the guest of the evening. The Liberals did well to show such honor to the young statesman of the west, who made such a manly fight in the recent contest when his opponents endeavored to drive him out of public life by a policy of slander and misrepresentation. Mr. Sifton won on his merits and his enthusiastic supporters are to be congratulated on his victory.

The Quebec electors almost made it unanimous for the Liberals in the Provincial elections last week. Of the seventy odd seats only five Conservatives were elected. And in Prince Edward Island yesterday the province went Liberal by 21 to 9.

A convention will be held at Weston on Wednesday of next week to nominate a candidate for the next Provincial Election for West York. Everything goes to show that the present member, Mr. W. J. Hill, will be the unanimous choice of the convention.

IN MEMORIAM.

"The memory of the just is blessed." The funeral of the late Mrs. John Coombs of Maple, who died on Wednesday, the 5th inst., in the 75th year of her age, took place on Friday afternoon, 7th inst., to the Carrville Cemetery. The funeral obsequies were largely attended. Since the late Mrs. Coombs was taken ill about three weeks ago, she and those who were near and dear to her had the sincere sympathy of an unusually wide circle

of friends and acquaintances in Maple and in Carrville, where she lived for many years until 1898, when her husband retired from farming and they have since lived retired in their pretty home, "Fair View," Maple. The last few days of her life her sufferings were distressing to witness, and often during her paroxysms of pain her loving attendants thought she could not live. When she would see them weeping to see her suffer and powerless to give relief, she would say, "Don't weep for me, but pray that I may have patience; 'tis hard work, but it will soon be over." She lingered on, bearing her weakness and pain with Christian fortitude and resignation until a short time before her death, when she seemed much better and brighter, though it was evident that the work of dissolution was progressing rapidly, and about 8.45 a. m. on Wednesday, she peacefully breathed her last, falling asleep in the arms of Jesus.

Calm was the moment and serene, When all her sufferings closed;
No agony or struggle seen,
No feature discomposed.
She has left a sorrowing husband, four sons and four daughters (all of whom are married with the exception of one son) to mourn the loss of a faithful wife, and a loving devoted mother.

The pall-bearers were G. Coombs, W. Coombs and C. Coombs of Bradford; F. Coombs, Newmarket, nephews of deceased, and Wm. and Ernest Baker of Carrville, grandsons. Rev. J. W. Stewart of Eglington, whom deceased had several days prior to her death chosen to preach the sermon, took as his text St. John xiv., 2-3, and delivered an appropriate discourse with much feeling and effect. Other clergymen who assisted in the solemn service were the Revs. W. Dean, Maple; S. L. W. Harton, Epworth Methodist Church, Toronto; A. J. G. Carscadden, Carrville, and W. Booth, Todmorden.

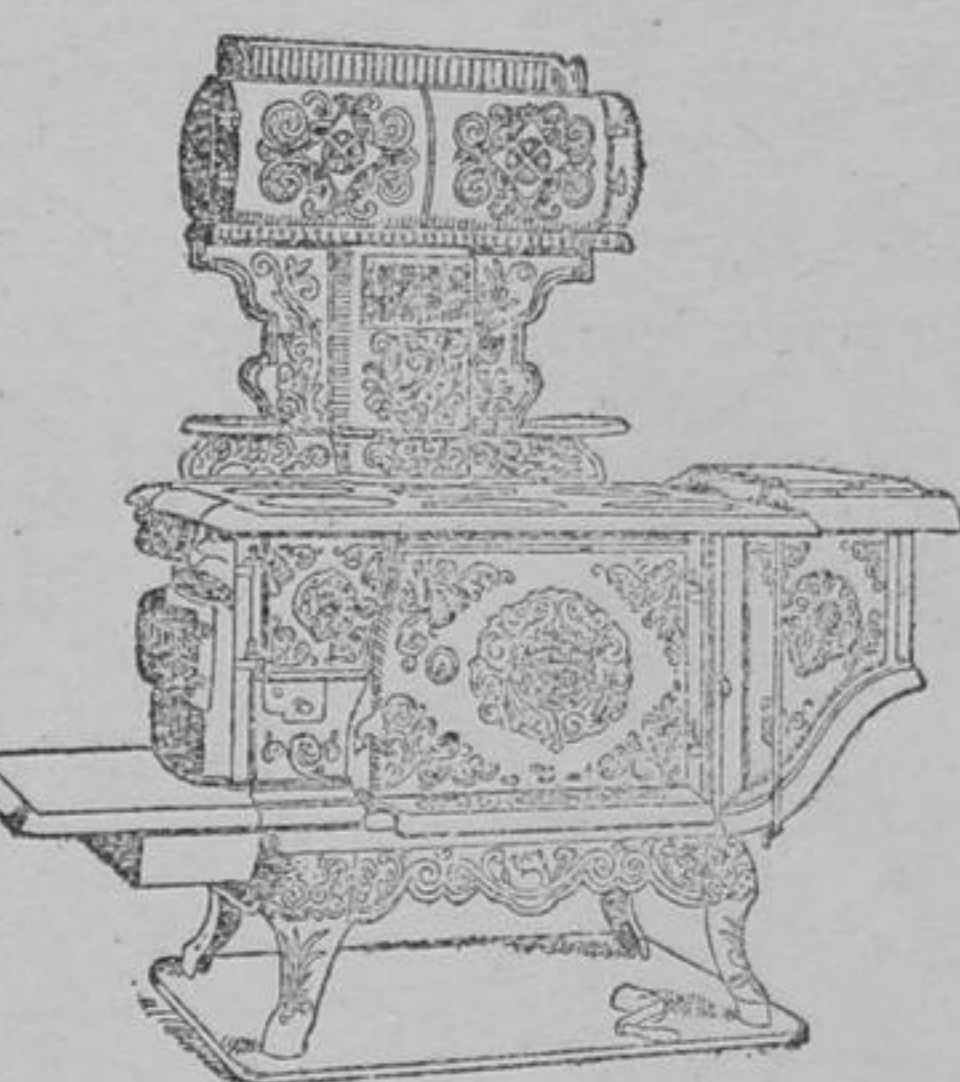

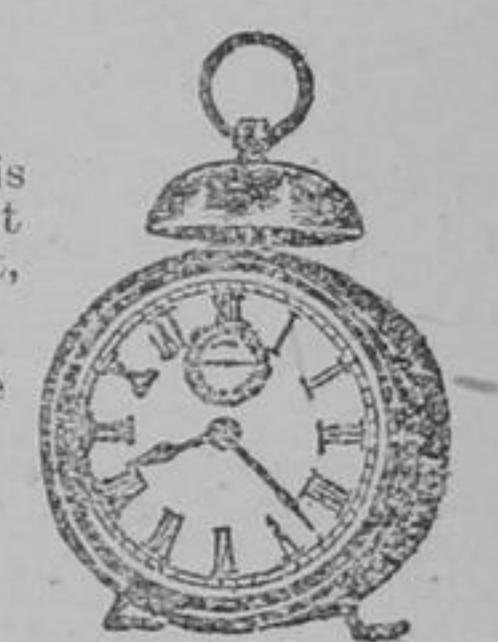
