PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

There was a good attendance at the annual meeting of the congregation on Wednesday evening, 23rd inst. Rev. J. A. Grant presided, and Mr. Thos. Newton acted as secretary. The reports from the different departments of the church's work showed that the past year has been the most prosperous for some time. The report of the Session showed a large addition to the membership of the church, also an increased attendance at the Sabbath services. The contributions to the schemes of the church exceeded that of last year, while in addition thirty dollars had been sent to the Indian Famine Fund. The Sabbath School reported that good work had been done, about ninety dollars had been contributed, a good part of which goes to missions. The Board of Managers announced that financially it had been the best year for a long time. They had been able to meet all liabilities and had a balance of twenty-five dollars to begin the new year. The Ladies' Aid had, as usual, given good assistance and contributed over one hundred dollars to the treasury of the church. The Auxiliary to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and the Mission Band reported having given a good sum for Foreign Mission Work, besides sending a large supply of clothing to the Indians of the North West. The pastor reported that considerably over two hundred dollars had been subscribed for the Century Fund. He expected a good deal more, so could not report the definite amount until all the members of the congregation had intimated their contributions. After receiving and adopting the reports, the officers of the different departments were elected. The members of the Managing Board for year 1901 are Messrs. A. Newton, F. McConaghy, J. Kennerley, J. Savage, J. Innes, T. Newton, R. McLean, J. Brydon, and G. Cowie; Auditors, Jno. Boyle and Scott McNair. Mrs. John Boyle was elected President of the Ladies' Aid; Miss E. Newton, Vice-President; Miss J. Moodie, Sec'y; and Mrs. Skeele, Treas. The usual votes of thanks were accorded, after which those present spent a social hour, the ladies having provided excellent refreshments.
