Although nothing has yet been settled either by the Dominion or the Imperial Government as to whether the 24th of May is to continue to be a public holiday, it is more than likely that the day will be kept as heretofore for many years to come. No other time of the year appears to be so well adapted for a holiday as the latter part of May. For the past few years Empire Day has been observed on the 23rd of May by the school children. Why not change this to the 24th, and go on as before? The birthday of our late beloved queen will long be remembered by her faithful subjects. No demonstration is necessary to perpetuate her good name. But a holiday about the 24th of May has grown to be almost a necessity in Canada. It will be tolerably safe, therefore, for towns and villages to proceed with their arrangements for an annual celebration as in former years.

The liquor law recently passed by the Manitoba Legislature has been declared by the highest court in the Province to be unconstitutional. This decision will cause much disappointment, not only to the temperance people of Manitoba, but to the whole Dominion. Had it been shown that the Province had power to pass such an Act, it might have been a success, as public opinion in Manitoba appears to be overwhelmingly in favor of prohibition. The vote in 1892 showed that 19,637 were for and only 7,115 against such a measure. In the Dominion plebiscite a little over two years ago the vote was 12,419 for, and 2,978 against prohibition. Under such circumstances it seems unfortunate that Provincial prohibition could not have been given a fair trial. In all probability the case will be appealed to the Privy Council.

The husband of Carrie Nation who has become notorious throughout the world as a smasher of saloon property seems to look upon his wife's escapades with perfect composure. He expresses the opinion that the law cannot interfere with her, and if she happened to get roughly handled in a melee the chances are he would not even then lose his equilibrium. Carrie is one of the wonders of the 20th century.

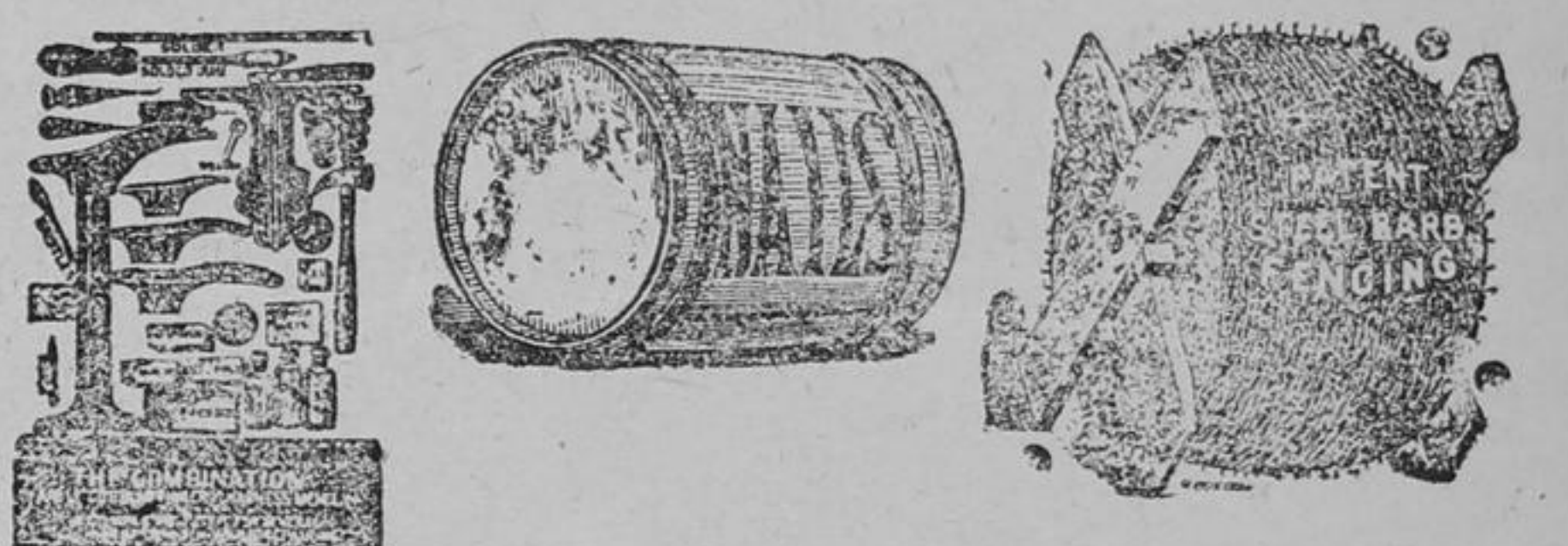
