The Auditors' Report of the Village Treasurer's Accounts for 1900 have been printed. The receipts for the year including balance last audit are \$3548.92, expenditure \$3280.65, leaving a cash balance in the Treasurer's hands of \$278.27. The assets including Fire Engine, Park, Buildings, &c., are given as \$12,658.88, while the liabilities (High School debentures) are \$4,972.59.

TO MEN AND BOYS.

Mr. Hill who has been assisting the pastors of the Methodist church in the special services for the past two or three weeks gave an earnest address to men and boys Sunday afternoon. The subject was, "The fare paid and who pays it?" The speaker based his remarks on a passage from Jonah, and gave many instances to show that men cannot do wrong and escape punishment. Men reap what they sow, and remorse of conscience is the outcome of doing wrong. Mr. Hill spoke of the dangers of drinking, gambling and dishonesty, and warned his hearers against the sins of impurity. One of the signs of an impure mind was a tendency to tell coarse, obscene and smutty stories, a habit which should be guarded against. Referring to the opposite-sex Mr. Hill said that if men and boys would act towards women and girls as they would wish their own mothers, sisters, wives or daughters treated, seldom would disrespect be shown by word or deed. The address should leave a lasting impression on the minds of those who heard it.
