**THE BUDGET.**

The budget speech delivered in the House of Commons last week by Mr. Fielding, Minister of Finance showed that Canada's aggregate foreign trade increased \$59,856,000 last year, the biggest increase in any one year since Confederation. This is the more significant when compared with the record of the 18 years of the National Policy—1878 to 1896—when the grand total of increase was but \$66,000,000. The grand total of increase in the foreign trade of Canada in the five years of Liberal tariff is \$157,000,000, or an average of over thirty-one millions of dollars per annum as against an average increase of a little over three million dollars in N. P. days. The Finance Minister also reminded the country that previous years under the present Liberal Administration had produced surpluses totalling in all over \$14,000,000, and he predicted a surplus in the present year, ending June next, of \$6,000,000 more, making for five years of Liberal financing (not reckoning 1896-97) surpluses aggregating considerably over twenty million dollars. Another feature of last year's financial statement was the fact that the national debt had been reduced. This has only occurred twice before since Confederation—once in 1871 under Sir Francis Hincks, and again in 1882 under Sir Leonard Tilley. In a young country like Canada where vast public works are needed to open up and develop the national resources, where railways, canals, harbors, etc., are necessary, and must be aided by large grants from the public funds heavy charges on capital account are to be expected but in spite of exceptional demands this past year, and in spite of the special call to equip the South African Contingents, the total expenditure had been more than met, and in addition, nearly \$800,000 had been clipped off the public debt. More than this—in spite of the substantial encouragement given to all legitimate enterprises, which is largely responsible for the splendid progress Canada is making,—the increase to the public debt since 1896 has been far less than in previous years averaging only \$1,749,000 as against an average increase during the eighteen years of management of \$6,663,000.

**Vaughan Council**

Vaughan council met on March 12. Members present: Messrs. Kirby (reeve), Malloy, Devins and Loughouse. Minutes read and adopted. Petitions were received from J. C. Steele and 50 others, and from Andrew Lloyd and 58 others asking the council to reduce hotel licenses from \$130 to \$110. The above petitions were laid over for further consideration. A petition was also presented from Thos. Lane and several others praying the council to oppose certain legislation which was about to take place at the present session of the Ontario House authorizing the junction of the Metropolitan Street Railway with the C. P. R., thereby making Yonge St. a trunk line for heavy freight traffic. A petition was presented by Robt. Forbes, signed by a number of rate-payers, asking to have a certain portion of what is known as Old Yonge St. in the village of Thornhill closed for public travel. On motion the Auditor's Report of the Treasurer's Accounts for 1900 were received and adopted. On motion the Reeve, Councillor Boyle and Mr. W. H. Clubine were appointed a committee to meet the Legislative Committee in compliance with Mr. Lane's request. Devins—Longhouse—that the following accounts be paid: Andrew McNeil, 1100 lbs. of hay, \$6 60 T. F. McMahon, printing, etc. 71 70 Longhouse—Malloy—that the treas. pay the following road accounts: John Watson, gravel, \$13 30 Michael Powers, repairing road, 2 50 Jns. S. No. 7. Council adjourned to meet on Monday, March 18. List of Pathmasters to be given next week. The council met at the Town Hall on Monday, 18th inst., as a special meeting for unfinished business. Members present: Mr. Jas. H. Kirby, reeve; Messrs. Donald M. Malloy, Isaac Devins, John N. Boyle and Daniel C. Longhouse, councillors. The minutes of last meeting read and adopted. Devins—Boyle—that the petitions of Messrs. J. C. Steele and Andrew Lloyd, requesting that the amount of hotel licenses be reduced \$20, be not entertained as the time has elapsed for making any change for the present year.—Carried. Devins—Malloy—that the Clerk be instructed to notify Mrs. Forbes of Thornhill, that the council have decided to pass a by-law, in accordance with the wishes of your petitioners asking to have a certain portion of what is known as Old Yonge Street, closed, and establish a new street leading to Yonge St. in lieu thereof, after the necessary legal proceedings have been fully complied with.—Carried. Devins—Longhouse—that the Clerk be instructed to employ P. S. Gibson (Civil Engineer) to locate the St. con., across lot 35, and establish said road to town line between King and Vaughan.—Carried. Malloy—Longhouse—that the treas. pay Henry Rumble \$2, for 20 loads of gravel at 10c. per load.—Carried. Malloy—Devins—that the treas. pay P. S. Gibson, C. E., \$14, for making award under the Ditches and Water-courses Act, lot 14, con. 6.—Carried. Council adjourned to meet at the Town Hall, Vellore, on Tuesday, April 9th, at 10 a. m.


