The men who volunteered to go out to South Africa as a part of Baden Powell's Constabulary, have embarked for their long journey or are about ready to start from Halifax. There are nearly a thousand of them, and it is said they are a fine looking lot of young stalwarts. Their general good conduct and their soldierly bearing have been freely commented on. They leave with the warmest good wishes of all classes, coupled with a sincere hope that the great majority will return to Canada when their term of service is concluded.

Professor Robertson, Dominion Dairying Commissioner, has been telling the Agricultural Committee of the House of Commons what is being done in chicken fattening experiments. He looks for an enormous trade in the shipping of dressed fattened poultry to the English market, a good start having already been made. He stated too that a splendid market may be found in Montreal for these chickens. This of course is practically a new industry, called into existence and made possible by the progressive, up-to-date cold storage policy of the Department of Agriculture.

The death of Samuel Marin, a long-time and highly respected resident of Fairfax, Polk Co., Minnesota, occurred on Feb'y 11, at his residence, Fairfax, from cancer of the stomach. He was known among all his acquaintances as an honest, upright citizen, and was loved and esteemed wherever known. Mr. Marin was twice married, the first time to Mary Quinlan of Sanilac Co., Mich., and the last time to Almira Allen of Port Huron, Mich., who survives him. Of the first union two were born, the eldest being Representative W. A. Marin of Onsted, Polk Co., and Mrs. James L. Gillies of King City, Ont. Mrs. Gillies being in delicate health was not able to be with him in his illness.

Some three months ago the death of Catharine Marin, mother of Samuel Marin, was announced. Much sympathy is expressed for Mrs. Gillies in the loss of father and grandmother. 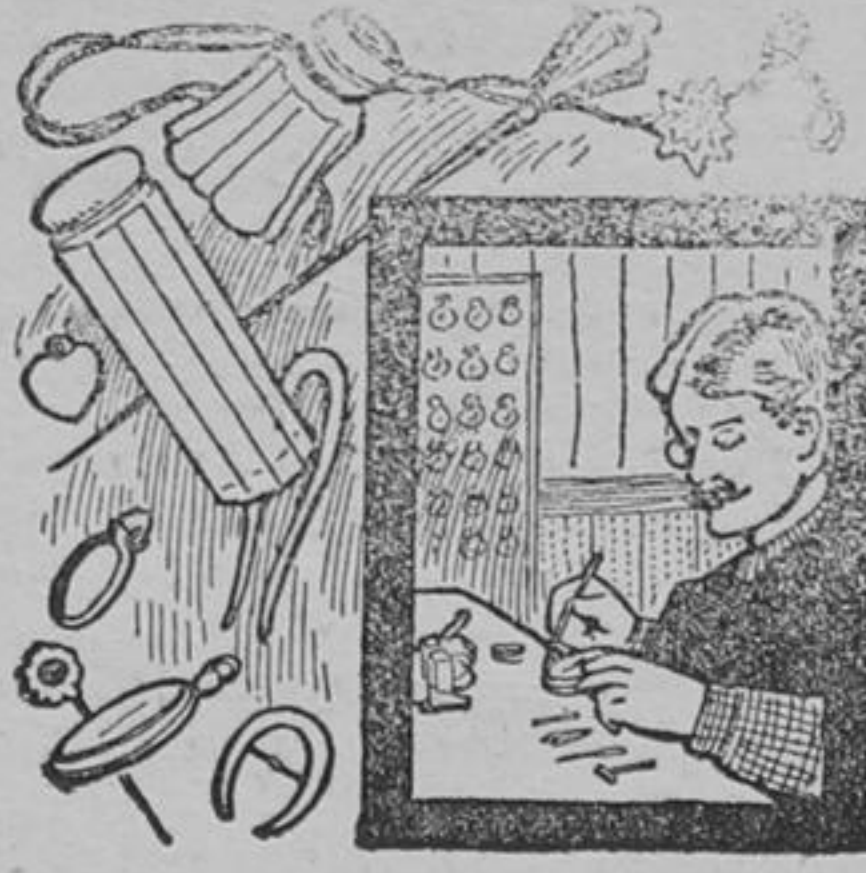

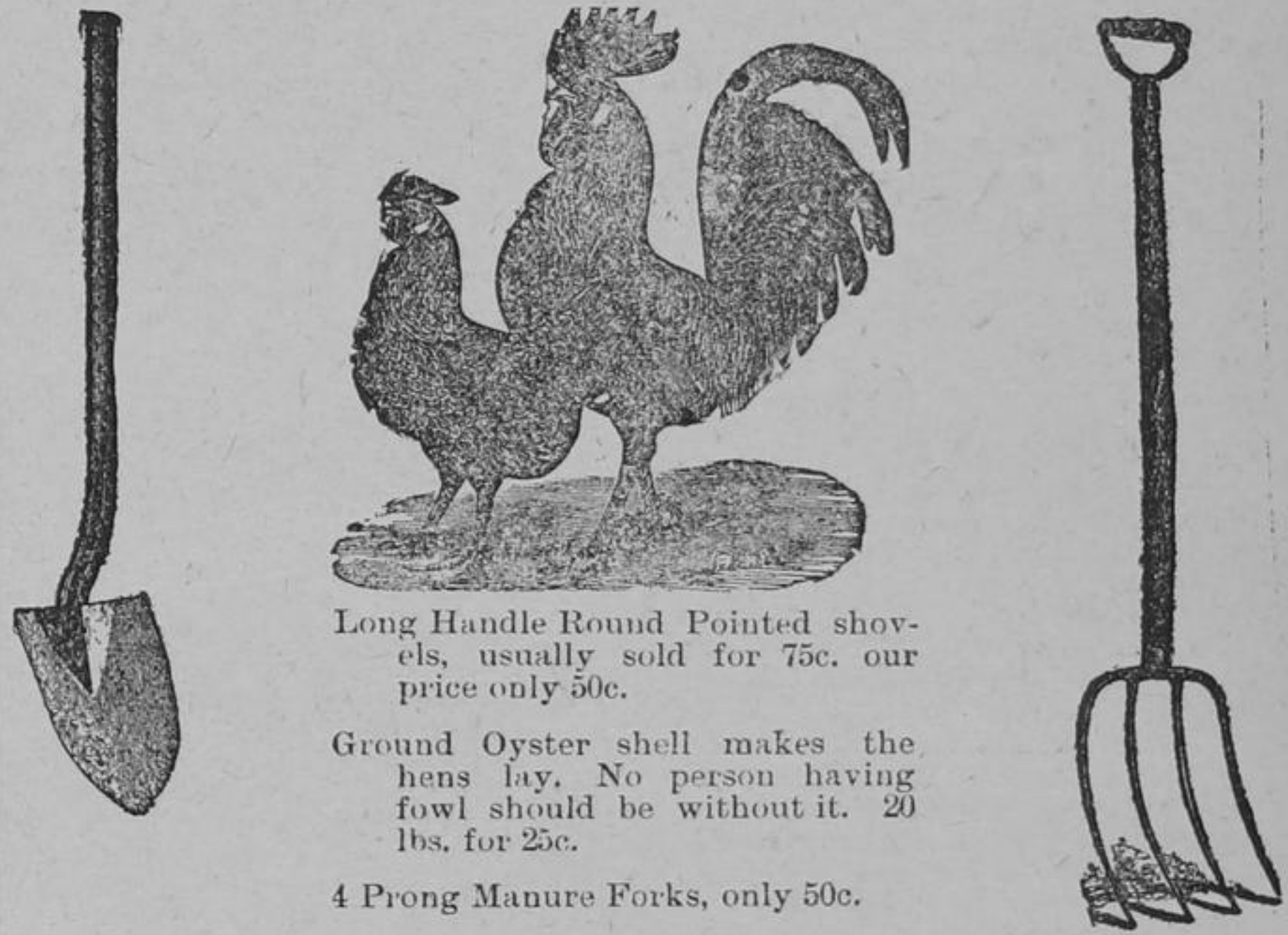
