HIGH SCHOOL REPORT. Our High School generally gets a good report from the Inspectors at their annual visits. The report of Inspector Hodgson, after his visit on the 11th of March, read at the Board meeting last Monday, however, is probably the best our school has ever received. The grading under each head ranges as follows: I, good; II, fair; III, poor; IV, bad. Under the head of Accommodation, the school grounds are marked I, school buildings I, class rooms I, halls I, cap room I, desks I, blackboards I, heating I, ventilation I. The teaching of English and History is marked I, Classics I, Drawing I, Mathematics I, French and German I, Science I; other subjects not inspected. The report shows that the equipment is satisfactory, time-table well arranged, division of work satisfactory, discipline excellent, etc., etc. The report closes with the following note:—"The spirit for progress that is evident in this school is worthy of commendation. The character of the teaching in the various departments is of a high order." Both the teachers and the members of the Board are to be congratulated.
