#### SUN FACTORIES.

The fields of our farms are so many factories driven by sunshine, in which raw materials are being worked into finished products. If we would double our output, we must double the stock out of which the wares are made. In the soil there are no inexhaustible stores from which the stock may be drawn. The nitrogen, it is true, comes from a boundless atmosphere, but with the best tilth we are able to maintain, it can only enter the soil at a limited rate and not such as to utilize the full power of the stream of sunshine flowing by, nor to maich the carbon carried in the wind. There is phosphorus and potash enough in the soil and rock beneath for 10 large crops a year, but the rate at which the best amount of water can bring it into soluble form is too slow for even one. SPITTING SHOULD STOP.

The Most Prolific Means of Propagating

One of the worst and most uncleanly habits indulged in by some people is spitting. Many people spit anywhere, everywhere and always. If this habit were only filthy it would not be so objectionable, but it is one of the most prolific means of propagating disease in every community. Spitting in public places should stop. The National Sanitarium Association in its campaign to check the spread of consumption, tuberculosis, claims that expectoration on the sidewalks for ladies' dresses to wipe up and carry into their homes or to dry into dust and float into the air; expectoration in public halls, conveyances, places of amusement, on floors, carpets and in dark corners of hotels and private dwellings, must cease if 'we ever hope to check this terrible disease which is responsible for so many deaths and so much suffering. Ladies should wear shorter skirts, and those who must expectorate should use paper handkerchiefs, which should be burned after using. There are three important facts about tuberculosis which should be kept in mind:-1. It is a communicable disease and

is distinctly preventable.

2. It is acquired by the direct transmission of the tubercle bacilli from the sick to the well, usually by means of dried and pulverized sputum floating as dust in the air; and

3. It can be largely prevented by simple and easily applied measures of cleanliness and disinfection.

ORCHARD AND GARDEN.

Trim the grape vines if they are not frozen.

It is not too late yet to haul manure to the orchard.

After the orchard is pruned gather

up and burn the brush. All manure for the garden should be thoroughly rotted and fined.

Raspberries should be set out as soon as the conditions of the ground

will permit. for several years should not be plowed

Whenever enough well-rotted and fine manure cannot be secured to properly fertilize the garden, the next best plan is to buy a sufficient quantity of commercial fertilizer and use . it as needed.


