YOUNG LIBERALS' MEETING.

The Young Liberals of Toronto are never backward in showing where they stand when attempts are made to stir up racial and religious prejudices in this country. At their annual meeting Monday evening one of the principal speakers was Senator Dandurand of Montreal. He responded to the toast, "Canada," in a patriotic speech, which was a complete refutation of the cries of French domination in Canada. He spoke of the loyalty of the French population in Quebec, and gave many reasons why they should be satisfied and contented under the English system of government. The words of the French senator created a feeling of enthusiasm among the guests, and the tone of the meeting was all in favor of unity in Canada. The speaker quoted a paragraph from a recent number of The Evening News in which it was hinted that there could be neither peace nor unity in this country "until we force the French-Canadians to adopt a different view of their destiny, or until they convert us by conquest into a French dependency. There is not room in Canada, wide as it is, for a loyal English population and a French one which gives its allegiance to old France, and is waiting for the opportunity to throw off the easy yoke of the present masters."

Mr. Dandurand showed the absurdity of the alleged disloyalty, and in the course of an able speech said:—"The reason of our loyalty is obvious. We are the oldest inhabitants in Canada; we have deep roots in this country; this is our home. When we leave it to go to a foreign land we do not say that we are going home until we are returning to Canada. Now, the charge goes further. It says that we would desire to fall back under the French flag. This is an insult to our intelligence. Why should we desire to abandon our freedom, our autonomy, our absolute control of our own affairs, to return to what? To the status of a French colony, which has but the empty honor of a representative in the Parisian Parliament? We have here a self governing colony; we elect our own members of Parliament, do our own business as we please. And we are expected to throw that to the winds, abandon it, and return to a system in which we would have no control of our own affairs, would be governed by a non-responsible Government, as the French colonies are! It is absolutely preposterous. Let any newspaper man go through the Province and he will not find a single French-Canadian so foolish as to think of ever changing our allegiance as we have it to-day."

In replying to the toast "Ontario," Mr. Arch. Campbell made an excellent speech. He touched on many points and spoke at some length of the transportation question, the new lines which were being projected into New Ontario, and the Canada National Railway. Mr. Campbell referred to the lamentable fact that the huge expenditure by Canada upon her canals had been largely thrown away, for of 300,000,000 bushels of wheat sent from the west only some 40,000,000 bushels went by the Canadian canals. They should so improve their transportation facilities that at least 100,000,000 bushels should go to the sea by way of Toronto and Montreal.

The Ontario Government has shown itself thoroughly abreast of the times in its railway policy. It has always been quick to anticipate public sentiment and alert to implement it when that sentiment was

healthy. Perhaps no executive body has kept such a careful gage of public opinion, or has steered so wise a course among many conflicting elements. In this stage of our development, Ontario needs railways, and railways need capital to build them. Without discouraging capital, the Ross Government has kept in mind the fact that railways are public utilities, and ought some day to be the property of the people if they so choose. Some of the provinces of the Dominion are not yet in favor of taking into their hands the public ownership of railways, although they appear to be swinging round gradually in that direction. As far as this province is concerned, however, there is a growing sentiment for public ownership and Government control. During the present session the Ontario Government has decided in favor of investigating the question of Government ownership, and if the investigation is satisfactory the Temiscamingue Railway will likely be built and operated by the Government. It may not be wise to be too hasty in the matter, but there is evidently a growing feeling in favor of Government ownership.

As the law has stood for a number of years past High Schools in towns separated from the county, Toronto Junction for example, have been drawing large grants from the county the same as those High Schools in the county. During the present session Mr. John Richardson, member for East York, has introduced an Act which while not cutting off the grant will require the outside towns to contribute their proper share of taxes. The principal sections in Mr. Richardson's proposed bill are as follows: (6) Where in a town separated from the county, a High School is situated, and such High School is open to county pupils on the same terms as the municipalities not separated from the county, the county council shall in all such cases make to such High School the same grant as if the city or town were not separated from the county.

(6a) The towns mentioned in the last preceding subsection shall pay to the county for High School purposes the same sum as such towns would pay to the county for such purposes if such towns were not separated from the county, and the assessment of such towns were equalized, and the equalization of the assessment of such towns and the amount to be paid by it for High School purposes shall, unless mutually agreed upon, be fixed and settled by the county judge.

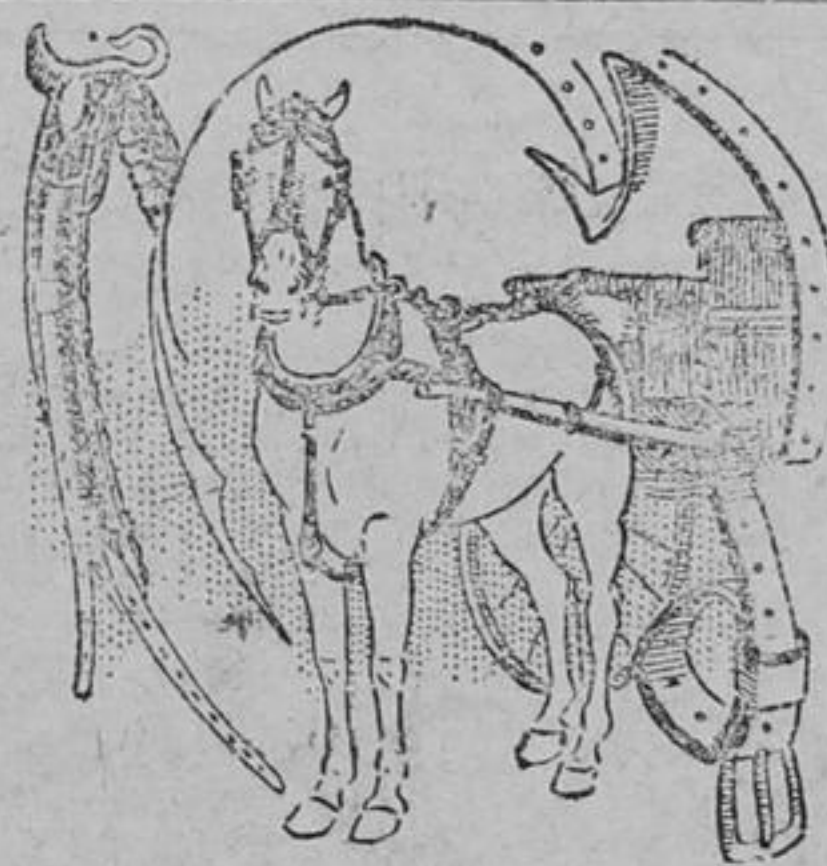

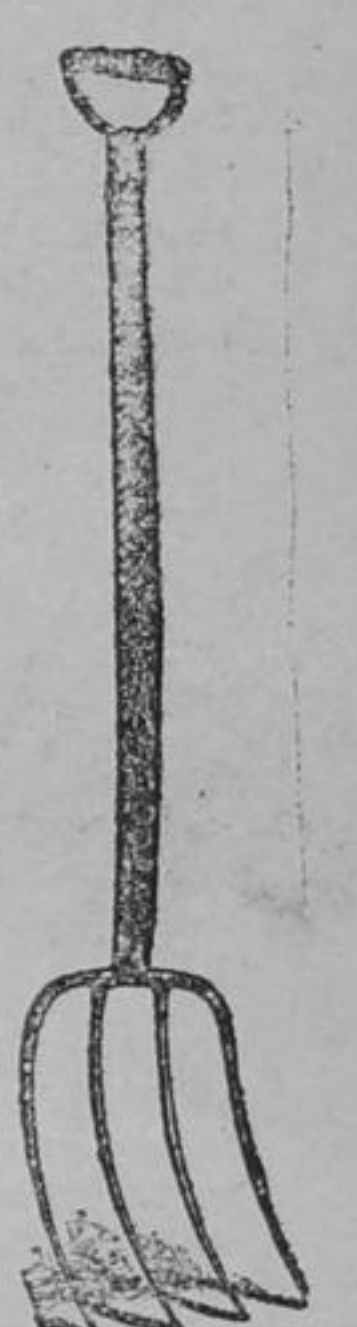
